WILLARD AND
FIRPO SIGNEDFirst Steps Toward World
Heavyweight Battle Taken
By Tex Rickard

NEW YORK, May 15.—(By the Associated Press)—Preliminary moves toward a contest for the world heavyweight championship was made today by Tex Rickard, promoter in the signing of Jess Willard former title holder and Luis Firpo, Argentine giant, for a contest to be held in New York or vicinity not later than July 7.

The winner of this engagement will be matched with the winner of the Jack Dempsey-Tommy Gibbons contest in a title match, which probably will be held next Labor day.

Rickard declined to reveal the terms for the Firpo-Willard match except that they will fight on a percentage basis.

The contest will be staged either at Boyce's Thirty Acres in Jersey City or the Yankee Stadium. The attitude of the state athletic commission toward Willard may have a bearing on whether the bout is staged in this state. William Muldoon, chairman of the commission author of the ruling preventing men over 38 years of age from appearing in boxing contests in this state, allowed Willard to meet Floyd Johnson last Saturday because the affair was for charity.

May Meet Before July

It was believed, however, that the age ruling would be set aside by the commission in view of Willard's victory over Johnson, a man half his age.

Should Firpo's match in Mexico City go through it is improbable that he could be ready to meet Willard before July 7.

Receipts from the heavyweight boxing carnival at Yankee stadium Saturday were announced officially by Promoter Rickard today as \$349,997. Of this amount the municipal milk fund, for the benefit of which the fights were conducted, will receive approximately \$200,000.

Promotion expenses, including the payroll of \$85,300 for the ten boxers on the program have not been definitely fixed but were estimated at about \$150,000.

gained his freedom when a squad of Chinese troops, attacked the bandits who fled. Serious anti-Japanese riots broke out today at Shashi, province of Hupeh. Shashi is on the upper Yangtze river, above Hankow, from which latter point a Japanese gunboat has been rushed to the scene to reinforce the one Japanese craft already there. Advice from Shanghai state that several were killed and a large number injured. In the Shashi disturbance which grew out of the Chinese boycott of Japan's refusal to abrogate the famous "twenty-one demands" treaty of 1915.

War is in progress in Kwang Tung province between the constitutional army of Sun Yat Sen, composed of Kwangtung and Yunnan troops and forces from Kwangai province which are said to have the backing of the northern militarists. At this time the movement of the constitutionalists appear to have the advantage.

Wanted at Postoffice

What is the difference between a designated auto rural postal route and a plain postal route where the mail is carried in an auto?

The biggest difference is \$650 a year to the operator. That's the way Uncle Sam designates 'em. A horse-route is of about 24 miles. One may use a filver, and might possibly carry the mail on skis, or in a wheelbarrow, and it is still a horse-route. But certain routes that are designated as "auto routes" start in on a salary of \$2450 a year and can climb up to \$2600 a year. The auto routes are longer. They might cover up to 50 miles or even more.

A new mail carrier is needed for the Salem rural force, and a set of substitutes for emergencies. The civil service department is to hold an examination on June 9, beginning at 9 o'clock, for this and other similar vacancies. The applicant needs to be between 18 and 50 years of age, except where he has military preference to give him federal credit. Wives or widows of former soldiers or sailors may apply for the same military preference that their husbands would have received.

A good physical examination must be passed and also a mental test that gives spelling a value of 10 points, penmanship 20 points, copying 20 points, letter writing 20 points, and arithmetic 30 points. The examination will be held at the Salem postoffice.

Jory Complains About
Commission's Opinion

Ed A. Jory of the Liberty district has registered with the public service commission a complaint relative to the recent opinion of the commission on the extension of rural telephone service.

Mr. Jory says that the opinion of the commission does not touch the matter of his complaint, which was that the Salem manager of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company agreed in 1920 to give service to eight new members if they would construct a new line to Liberty. The Jory letter says this was done, but that they have not been given the service promised. He avers that the opinion of the commission does not seem consistent, "as with one breath you say it is discriminatory to run two miles from the city limits and in the next you request that the exchange limits be extended half a mile south of the city limits. Why not make it two miles to Liberty, which has been the exchange limit for the past 18 years, without any objection from the telephone company?"

Mr. Jory adds that about 200 subscribers are affected by the decision and that they would like a hearing in the case.

The commission claims that the case involves disposal by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company of the line now in use, and has a letter from C. E. Hickman, Oregon manager of the company, to that effect.
