CHAMP FIGHTS ONLY H. WILLS

Jack Kearns Sidesteps Possibility of Match With Willard or Firpo

GREAT FALLS, Mont., May 19.—The heavyweight battle for championship honors next Labor day will not be between Dempsey and Willard or Firpo, says Jack Kearns, manager of Dempsey, heavyweight champion of the world, but will be between Dempsey and Harry Wills, colored heavyweight fighter.

"This statement," said Kearns to an Associated Press correspondent today is of course, predicted upon Dempsey winning over Tommy Ibbons in the championship battle of the world in Shelby, July 4."

"Neither Willard nor Firpo, who ever may win in their coming fight, would make a drawing card equal to Wills or be as hard to crack. Dempsey does not draw the color line and is willing to go against Wills Labor day if a satisfactory offer is made and Dempsey holds the belt against Ibbons in the Shelby fight."

Dempsey Feels Good

Kearns arrived here last night and will go to Shelby Tuesday to see what progress is being made in the work of preparing for the bout of July 4. He will return here the latter part of the week to remain with Dempsey at the training camp until July 4. The contractors of the Shelby arena are putting a large crew of men to work and are to rush it to completion by June 30.

Dempsey has not started heavy work as yet and today took a five-mile road workout with George Godfrey, the giant negro; shadow boxed ten rounds and skiped the rope for 45 minutes.

He looks in the best of conditions and expresses himself as well pleased with his camp on the Missouri river.

Tommy Ibbons of St. Paul, contender for the title against Dempsey in Shelby July 4, will arrive in Great Falls tomorrow evening and will be met by the municipal band. A large delegation of citizens expected to greet him.

Later in the evening he will be tendered a complimentary banquet at a local hotel by the Knights of Columbus.

BOHLER LEAVES WILLAMETTE U

May Accept Post at WSC; New Chemistry Instructor Is Selected

Herman Clark, for the past five years the head of the chemistry department in the Salem high school, has been chosen as assistant head of chemistry in Willamette university, to begin this fall. He is a graduate of the Willamette, from seven years ago, and he received his master's degree from his alma mater for advanced chemical research. He is rated as an exceptionally clever instructor. Prof. Florian Von Eichen will continue as head of the department.

It is announced definitely that Coach Roy Bohler will not accept reappointment at Willamette, but that he has a flattering offer to take over the freshman class in Washington State college at Pullman, and he may accept this. Some good offers from elsewhere, one being from California, are said to have been made to him, and he will have the choice of several fine appointments. His work in demanding a high standard of clean play and sportsmanship, has been greatly appreciated both in Willamette and in all the colleges that have had athletic relations with him. The three Bohlers, at Willamette, at Oregon and at Washington State college, have practically renovated college athletics from a moral point of view.

It is announced further that there have been many applications for the position of athletic director in Willamette, some from coaches of almost national reputation. The name of C. C. Cauffman, of Simpson college, Indianola, Iowa, has been presented, and his reputation as a basketball mentor might make him a great acquisition to the northwest. He is originally from the University of Illinois.

Another name that has been mentioned is that of Guy L. Rathbun, now assistant professor of physical education in OAC. He is from Heloit, college and the University of Indiana, and from what is known of his abilities here in the northwest, he should be of great value to Willamette or any college.
