Army Officers Opportunity—The United States army recruiting officer, located in the post-office, has been authorized to enlist men in the army for stations on the eastern coast. Authority has been granted by the war department to enlist men for stations in the following named states: Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia. Men enlisted under this authority will be sent to Fort McDowell, San Francisco, and will go from there through the Panama canal by transport to points on the east coast. This is an exceptional opportunity for young men who are eligible, to see the world at the expense of the government. Men between the ages of 18 and 25 who are physically fit, are eligible for enlistment.
