FIRPO-WHITE BOUT IS DECLARED OFF

Boxing Enthusiasts Demand
That Promoters Arrange
for Substitute

HAVANA, May 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—The boxing bout between Luis Angel Firpo, South American heavyweight, and Joe White of New York, which has been arranged for next Sunday, has been called off.

This afternoon during a sparring match with Estanislao Frias, a Cuban negro welterweight, White was twice knocked out by the lighter man, with 12-ounce gloves.

Groups of fight enthusiasts congregated outside of the arena Colon, where the boxers have been training, and demanded that the promoters of the bout substitute Antiohial Firro, Cuban heavyweight champion, as Firpo's opponent Sunday afternoon.

Firpo, who weighs about 220 pounds, knocked out Sailor Martin of New York in the first round of a bout here last Sunday. Firpo, who was a spectator, characterized Firro as "a veritable cyclone."

It is not known whether Firpo will accept Firro as an opponent if the boxing commission should sanction the bout.

AMERICAN GOLF TEAM BACK HOME

Doner of Walker Cup Greets
Victors When Huge
Liner Docks

NEW YORK, May 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—Ten members of the victorious American Walker cup golf team which defeated a British team at St. Andrews, Scotland, in defense of the international trophy May 18 and 19, returned today on the Majestic. The team was welcomed by a delegation headed by Wynant D. Vanderpool, vice president of the United States Golf association; Howard F. Whitney, former president, and George H. Walker, donor of the trophy bearing his name but due to the desire of the players to return to their homes as quickly as possible, plans for a reception here tonight were cancelled.

J. F. Byers of Pittsburgh, president of the U. S. G. A., who accompanied the invaders, and Robert A. Gardner of Chicago, team captain, were enthusiastic over the American victory, which was scored by the narrow margin of six matches to five, with one match tied after an uphill struggle for the two day series.

Particular praise was accorded the achievements of Francis Oulmet, veteran Boston star, and Dr. O. F. Willing, the Portland, Or. dentist, whose playing was a sensation of the invasion. Oulmet brought back a silver replica of the St. George's challenge cup, the trophy at stake in a preliminary tournament which he won by defeating Dr. Willing in a play-off.

NEW YORK, May 29.—Johnny Kilbane, world's featherweight boxing champion, and Eugene Crique of France, challenger, announced today that they had reached the fighting edge and would work only lightly until their 15-round title match at the Polo Grounds Saturday afternoon. AUTO CLASSIC STAGE IS SET

Twenty-Three Machines in
Readiness for Indianapolis
Races Today

INDIANAPOLIS, May 29.—The list of certain starters in tomorrow's 500-mile automobile race here was increased to 23 when a French car driven by Raoul Riganti, qualified by turning 10 miles in 6:18.72, an average speed of 95.3 miles an hour.

Three other machines built by a local manufacturer will take their qualifying trials at 4:30 tomorrow morning, according to official announcement. They must average 80 miles or better to earn the right to start.

Speculation was rife tonight as to the new machines which have a piston displacement of not more than 122 cubic inches, about two-thirds the size of the smallest motors built for passenger cars in the United States. The automobiles are of the one-seater type and are much lighter than any other racing automobile ever entered in the local event. The majority of the American cars have eight cylinders.

Many Prizes Offered
Three German cars and five French machines also are entered. They are heavier than the American speedsters and, while they have not shown as much speed, give every indication of being sturdy and enduring. The drivers of the machines—American, French and German—for the most part are veteran race drivers.

The race drivers will compete for prizes totaling approximately \$85,000, it was said today. The speedway divides \$50,000 among the first ten to finish. In addition the lap prize fund amounts to more than \$10,000 and automobile and accessory firms give monetary prizes and

nually amounting to nearly \$35,000. A portion of the lap fund is given to the driver leading each of the 200 laps necessary to complete the race.

The race will begin at 10 o'clock in the morning as usual. Captain Eddie Rickenbacker will be the starter.
