WILLAMETTE LEADS
IN TENNIS GAMESUniversity Players Promise
to Win Non-Conference
Tournament

Willamette is serving as hosts and hostesses to the tennis teams from four other non-conference colleges and yesterday the Willamette players swamped the champions of three of the visitors, losing only one set out of the four matches.

Miss Elva Burris won in a hard fight, 6-0, 2-6, 8-5, from the woman representative of Linfield. Miss Burris had handily defeated the best woman player from Pacific university of Forest Grove three weeks ago, and the Willamette men annihilated the Pacific men in five straight set matches. The Forest Grove institution did not send candidates for a second round.

Huston and Emmel won from Philomath in straight sets, 6-1, 6-1. Huston defeated Linfield, 6-1, 6-0; and Emmel and Miss Burris won the mixed doubles from Pacific, 6-3, 6-3. This gave Willamette all four of the matches played in the preliminaries, and indicates a grand sweep for the whole tournament.

Monmouth looks like a formidable contender in the women's matches, having won all three of the four contests in which they have played. Miss Melvin of Monmouth beat Miss Rapston of Albany, 6-0, 6-0; also she defeated Miss Terrell of Pacific college, 6-2, 6-2, and Misses Wolff and Hattan of Monmouth, won from Misses Hester and Terrell, of Pacific college, 7-5, 6-2. The two Monmouth men, Edwards and Graham, lost to Cook and Hinshaw of Pacific, 6-3, 6-1.

Sox and Lawrence of Albany won from Wakeman and Stewart of Linfield, 4-6, 6-3, 6-3. Sox then dropped a hard match to Cook of Pacific college, 6-3, 3-6, 6-3.

Games are being played simultaneously on the Willamette courts and the courts of the Salem Tennis club at the state hospital grounds. Play will be resumed this morning at 9:30 with three or four preliminaries to be played off. When these are finished, the finals will be posted, and play begin at once.

Willamette looks like the sure winner, with four matches won and none lost. Monmouth is second with three won and one lost, Albany is third with one won and one lost, Pacific college has won one and lost three, Philomath has played and lost the only game assigned, and Linfield has lost three and won none. Monmouth and Willamette are quite likely to fight it out for the women's singles, Miss Burris against Miss Melvin.

Snelling Soon to Leave
For Rotary Convention

R. O. Snelling expects to leave on June 14 to attend the Rotary International at St. Louis, Mo. He represents the local club as delegate to the great world convention. He goes to Portland to help make up the string of three Pullmans and a special dining car that will make the whole trip, carrying the northwest delegates, and gathering up more cars until by the time it gets down towards the Missouri river it will be a solid, special Rotary train.

At Kansas City there will be a stop-over, and a celebration that is to break a number of records for intensive good times. From Kansas City where the International president lives, the northwestern delegates travel on the president's special train.

Returning home after the convention, Mr. Snelling will go on to Chicago, and then will come home over the southern route, visiting the Texas and California oil fields, and getting his feet and clothes intimately acquainted with rushers, and stocks, and oil brokers, and other oily or oleaginous terms. He expects this to be a wonderful educational trip in the opportunity it gives him to see the oil business from the ground up—and down. The trip will require about three weeks.

HONOR WINNERS
WILL BE NAMEDAlpha Kappa Nu Elections to
Be Announced at Willamette Monday

Announcement will be made at the chapel service Monday of the winners of the honors in the Alpha Kappa Nu fraternity contest in Willamette university. The fraternity is an honor organization, to which not more than 20 per cent of the students of any one year may be elected by the faculty for their scholastic achievements during their four years of college life.

It is understood that there will be about 11 members chosen from this year's senior class. The names are not yet given out for publication, and some may even yet be doubtful. The distinction carries no financial reward, but the honor is sought after.

The Colonel Percy Willis prize, an annual award of \$25 to the student who throughout the school year has done the most real good to fellow students and the university by deeds of kindness and genuine helpfulness coupled with steadfast devotion to high ideals and upright character, will probably be awarded Monday. This also is by faculty election. Last year Miss Esther McCracken of Prosser, Wn., a member of this year's graduating class, was honored by this selection.

Dr. J. M. Walters, pastor of the First Methodist church at Eugene, and one of the greatest public orators of the west, will be the chief speaker at the honor presentation services Monday. The public generally is invited to attend.

LEGION VICTOR
OVER YEOMEN

Score 6 to 3 in Snappy
Game—Third Inning Bad
One for Losers

The Legion triumphed over the Yeomen, 6 to 3, in a snappy baseball game at Sweetland field last night in the Twilight league series. The Yeomen are still fighting for breath, after the first one of two annihilations dealt out to them by the older, more seasoned teams of the league, but they are following the Come plan of getting every day better and better, and they are now playing a brand of ball that gives the best of their foemen a proper scare.

Mid-West Universities
Meeting on Track Today

ANN ARBOR, Mich., June 1.—(By the Associated Press).—With 339 athletes from 17 mid-west universities entered the western conference outdoor track and field championships will be decided on Perry field tomorrow, with indications favoring a triumph for Michigan over Illinois.

Failure of the Illinois stars to qualify in the running high jump and the discus throw in the preliminaries today, virtually ruined the Illinois chances for victory, but Illinois may be expected to wage a desperate contest for second place honors.

Every university in the "big ten" and seven outside institutions will have entries in the events tomorrow. Notre Dame will have the biggest entry of the non-conference universities. The other outside teams competing will be Wisconsin, Drake, Washington of St. Louis; Michigan Aggies, Earlham and the Western Michigan state normal.

SHIRLEY POPPIES

The Rev. William Wilkes, for a long time vicar of Shirley in England, died recently. He was a man of godly life and a faithful minister of religion, but the world will remember him as the man who gave it a new and lovely flower. It was in 1880 that Mr. Wilkes found in his vicarage garden a white-edged variety of the common scarlet poppy. He saved and planted the seed. Only a few plants produced the white-edged flowers, but those he carefully bred. The stock showed remarkable power of variation and after a number of years the clergyman-botanist had produced not only white-edged poppies, but pure white, yellow, pale pink and many other colors with golden centers instead of the black centers of the original field poppy. These interesting and lovely flowers now growing in almost every garden in the world are called Shirley poppies from the place of their origin.—Youth's Companion.
