Silverton Answer Filed—Silverton has the right, under its charter, to regulate traffic on its streets, according to an answer filed yesterday in the case of J. W. Parker vs. city of Silverton, L. C. Eastman, as mayor, William Service, recorder and Archie Thomas, as marshal and street commissioner. Parker operates a heavy bus and carries passengers between Salem and Silverton. He has failed, the answer states, to provide a suitable terminal, and uses the streets to receive and discharge passengers. This hinders traffic on the streets and through its charter and passage of an ordinance on March 28, 1923, the city has the right to regulate public utility vehicles and to require a license fee.
