## BROADWAY CAFE IS CLOSED

### FEZ WEARERS AFFECTED BY HEAT IN EAST

Many Prostrations Feature 49th Annual Convention of Mystic Shriners in Washington

### 20,000 NOBLES PARADE PENNSYLVANIA AVENUE

Three and One-Half Hours Are Necessary to Pass Reviewing Stand

WASHINGTON, June 5.—President Harding had a prominent part in the festivities incident to the opening here of the 49th annual convention of the Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. He reviewed a parade of 20,000 nobles, the feature event of the day delivered an address on fraternalism at the first session of the Imperial Council and attended tonight a banquet given for imperial potentate James S. McCandless of Honolulu.

### Harding Attends

WHEN Mrs. Harding and General Pershing, the executive, who is a noble of Aladdin Temple of Columbus, Ohio, remained for three and a half hours in his box in the reviewing stand in front of the White House as the long line of nobles passed through "the garden of Allah" on their march over the "burning sands" of Pennsylvania avenue from the capitol to Washington Circle. Mr. Harding wore a white suit and red fez, but General Pershing, also a noble, was in the uniform of his rank as general of the army.

### "Sands" Are Hot

Clear skies greeted the parade but long before the parade had ended the intense heat and great humidity made for discomfort for both the marchers and the thousands who packed the sidewalks and "circus" seats along the two miles of the pageant route. Heat prostrations were frequent and ambulances and temporary aid stations were kept busy. More than 60 persons, including Shriners, were taken to hospitals, while estimates were that equally as many were given first aid at the street stations. Those taken to hospitals were reported tonight to be out of danger.

### Many Events Staged

Daylight fireworks, an "air battle" between naval seaplanes and a "congress of seas" were other principal events of the day. Two attacks marked water pageant and coast guard life savers here for demonstrations during Shrine week effected rescues. One of the craft in the "congress of seas" collided with a draw of the highway bridge and four of its occupants, two women and two men, were thrown overboard by the impact. They were rescued promptly, as were a family of four who were thrown into the water by the collapse of a small landing from which they were viewing the river parade.

### Denver University Deded Million Dollar Buildings

DENVER, Colo., June 5.—For the creating of international social and industrial good will and the advancement of social research the A. C. Foster building and two adjoining structures, said to be valued at \$1,500,000 have been deeded to the University of Denver by James H. Causey, Denver investment banker, and former partner of Governor William E. Sweet, officials of the university announced tonight.

### FRENCH PRESS IS SURPRISED

Newspapers Raise Objection to Germany's Revised Reparation Proposals

PARIS, June 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—Germany's revised reparations proposals may come before the French and Belgian premiers at their conference in Brussels tomorrow. The information here is that copies of the note are being sent by special courier to Paris, Brussels, London and Rome and probably will be delivered tomorrow evening, but the semi-official newspaper, Le Temps, says the Belgian copy may reach Brussels during the premiers' meeting.

### RICH TAXPAYERS GROWING FEWER

Million Dollar Incomes in United States Are Reported by July 21

WASHINGTON, June 5.—The ranks of America's millionaire taxpayers continue to grow thinner, according to statistics of income for 1921, made public tonight by the internal revenue bureau which show that of the 6,662,176 firms and individuals filing returns for 1921, only 21 had incomes exceeding \$1,000,000. This represents a decrease of 12 from the number receiving million dollar incomes in 1920 and compares with 65 in 1919, 67 in 1918, 141 in 1917 and with 208 in 1916, the highest since the income tax laws became operative.

### ALBANY DISTRICT IS SIGNING PACT

Selling and Advertising Organization Appeals to Up-Valley Men

ALBANY, Ore., June 5.—(Special to the Statesman.)—When President H. H. Mumford and Special Organizer A. M. Chapman, both of Salem, presented the matter of loganberry organization to the logan growers of Albany tonight every grower in the large audience agreed to sign up for the big central state organization. The meeting was reckoned as the most successful of the whole campaign. While the loganberry acreage around Albany is mostly in small tracts, the aggregate is quite large. It is expected that within two days every acre of logans in the Albany district will be signed up for the central selling and advertising organization.

### PAIR ESCAPE INJURY WHEN PLANE FALLS

Pilot Rights Machine at End of 1000 Foot Drop, But Overturns in Landing

WALLA WALLA, Wash., June 5. An airplane piloted by C. B. Russell and carrying as a passenger Murray Ifft, hit an air pocket near Dixie this afternoon and fell nearly 1000 feet. Russell managed to right the plane just before reaching the ground, but turned over on landing, practically demolishing the machine. Neither aviator nor passenger were seriously injured.

### CLAN LEADER ESTABLISHES NEW SECTION

Knights of Kamalia, Probationary Order, Is Proclaimed By Simmons, Head of Organization

### UPBUILDING OF YEARS NOW FACES SUBVERSION

Personal, Political and Sordid Ends Declared Menace By Emperor

ATLANTA, Ga., June 5.—Establishment of the order of Knights Kamalia, as the "primary order of Knighthood" with a government "Separate and distinct from the government now controlling and directing the affairs of the first or the probationary order of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan," was proclaimed tonight by William Joseph Simmons, "in the exercise of the authority vested in me only as emperor of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, Inc."

### Oregon Tobacco Prices Fixed Says Commission

WASHINGTON, June 5.—The federal trade commission charges the conference of wholesale tobacco dealers of Oregon, the American Tobacco company, the Liggett & Myers Tobacco company, and others in complaints issued today, with entering into agreements for the purpose of fixing and maintaining standard re-sale prices of cured tobacco products. The Oregon conference named is a voluntarily incorporated trade organization composed of tobacco wholesalers and jobbers.

### HARDING WILL GIVE ADDRESS

President to Attend Oregon Trail Pageant Near Baker on Way to Alaska

WASHINGTON, June 5.—President Harding will make 14 addresses en route to the Pacific coast on his Alaskan trip and will speak in five coast cities after returning from Alaska, according to an official announcement of the executive's itinerary late today at the White House.

### PUPILS' RECITAL INNOVATION HERE

Professor Roberts' Pipe Organ Class of Willamette Is Presented

A pupils' recital was given last night at the First Methodist church by Professor Roberts' pipe organ class from Willamette university. Except for one instrumental trio number, the entire program was given by students, the first complete program of its kind, it is believed, in the history of Salem music. None of the students had ever before appeared in any sort of an organ program. It was a "brand new" program in every sense of the word. Next year Professor Roberts counts on having a number of these programs, making them a feature of his class work.

### TEXAS PROMOTERS ARE HANDED JOLT

Government Scores in First Drive Against Fraudulent Oil Schemes

FORT WORTH, Tex., June 5.—The government won its first victory in its first drive against alleged fraudulent oil promoters tonight when Charles Sherwin and H. H. Schwarz were sentenced to serve 10 years in the federal penitentiary to pay fines of \$15,000 each and "General Robert A. Lee" was sentenced to serve two years in the penitentiary and pay a fine of \$6,000. The sentences and fines were imposed on the defendants by Federal Judge Benjamin Bledsoe after the jury had returned a verdict of guilty against all three defendants tonight.

### SHERIFF ASKS DOG OWNERS TO PAY UP

Tax Must Be Turned in, Says John W. Orr—Law Was Not Repealed

Sheriff John W. Orr of Polk county is urging the owners of dogs in his county to come in and pay the license on the animals. The dog license law was up for repeal at the 1922 session of the state legislature, and many people deferred payment, awaiting the outcome on the measure. It was not repealed, but still many dog owners are holding out.

### MULLAN-GAGE ACT IS NOT HELD NECESSARY BY PROHIBITION MEN

Knickerbocker Grill Will Feel Full Effect of Padlock Section of Volstead Measure For Next Six Months; Laws Will Still Be Enforced Throughout New York Declares State Director Canfield.

NEW YORK, June 5.—Federal prohibition forces disclosed part of their future policy of controlling illicit liquor traffic without the aid of the Mullan-Gage state enforcement act when they closed, by court order, a popular Broadway cafe, the Knickerbocker Grill, for six months under the padlock section of the Volstead act.

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
