Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Roberts are home following several weeks spent in California. They made the trip by automobile and were gone five weeks.

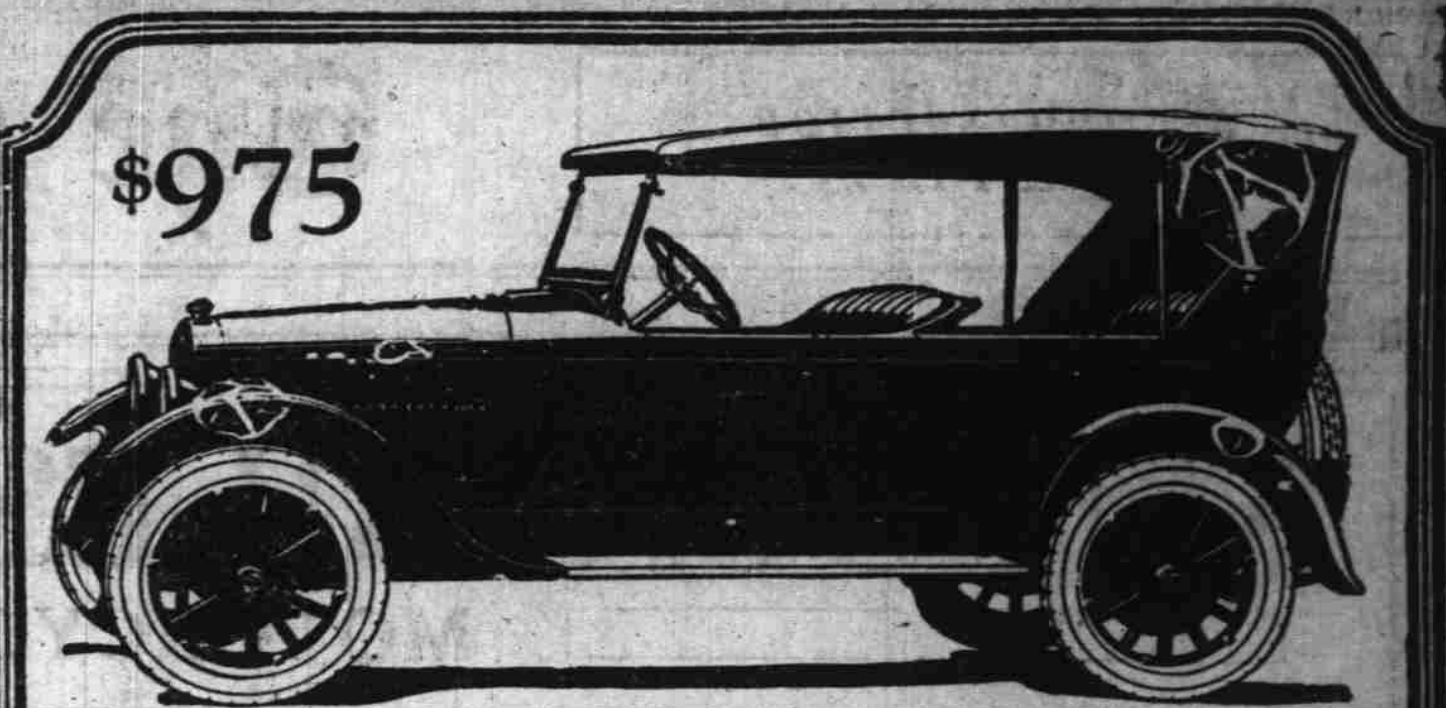
