ATHLETICS WILL BE ON PROGRAM

Annual Sunday School Picnic Will Give All Opportunity to Play

Nearly 300 of the Marion county Sunday schools are expected to be represented at the annual Sunday school picnic to be held at the fairgrounds next Saturday, June 16. Many athletic events have been listed for the day, the interest shown in these being attested by the 300 who took part last year.

Governor Walter M. Pierce will speak at 2 o'clock for those who do not care for the athletic contests.

Events will be staged in the stadium, for the greater part and have been nearly equally divided between the two sexes.

There will be boys' and men's races, rope pulls, relay race, with 15 to 20 on the side, a 50-yard dash, a centipede race with 15 to 20 on each side, a potato race, using four potatoes, race wherein all contestants are blindfolded, a shoe, barrel and sack race, with a spoon potato race. Fat men will also be given an opportunity to demonstrate their ability even

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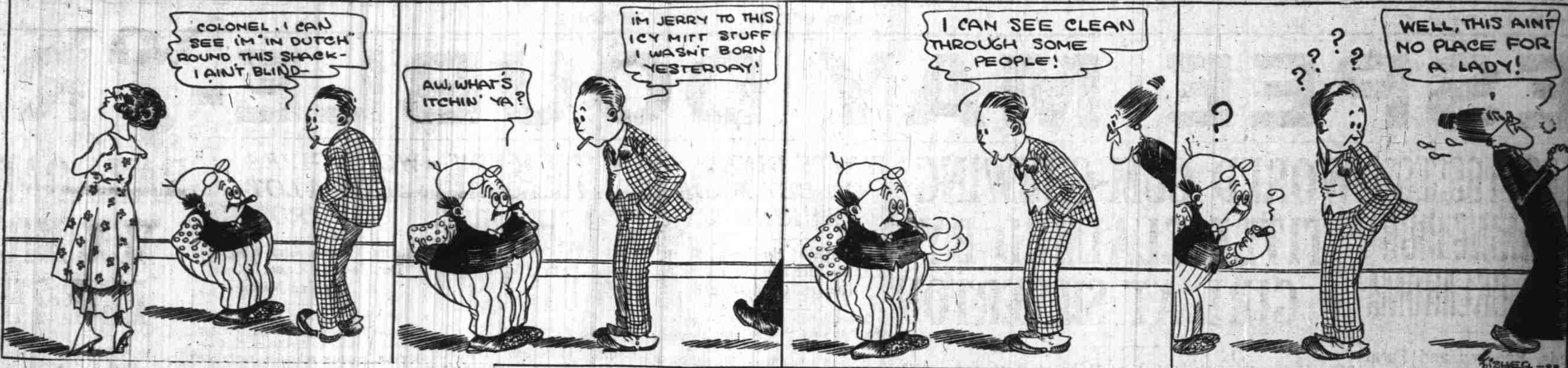
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though handicapped with extra aovirdups. A backward race, soccer and baseball, barrel boxing, horseshoe pitching and a three-legged race are also scheduled.

Nor are the women and the girls to be forgotten, with 15 to 20 on a side, a girls' rope pull will be staged, for the best two out of three. A centipede race and thread needle race are also slated. Fat women will show how they used to run when they were girls, while speed will be shown by the 5-yard dash. A relay race, with 15 to 20 on each side is also slated, as is a blindfold race, cage ball and a three-legged race.

Out-of-doors events include a baseball game, two playground ball games, volley ball and barrel punting.

GIBBONS TRAINS IN BLAZING SUN

St. Paul Challenger Has First Real Workout: Runs Fourteen Miles

SHELBY, Mont., June 11.—Under a blazing Montana sun Tommy Gibbons, St. Paul challenger, went through his first real workout here today in preparation for his title bout with Jack Dempsey on July 4. Several hundred visitors, many of them women, thronged Gibbons' camp to watch the challenger unlimber against three sparring partners, after a strenuous day, which included a 14 mile run, rope skipping, bag punching and calisthenics.

The challenger, after his workout, declared he was rapidly becoming acclimated and that his breathing was improving. He stepped from the ring today at the conclusion of his workout, apparently as fresh as the proverbial daisy.

Kansas State Law Held To Be Unconstitutional

WASHINGTON, June 11.—The Kansas law creating state industrial relations court was declared unconstitutional by the supreme court today so far as it attempts to fix wages in packing houses. Chief Justice Taft, delivering the decision in a case brought by the Charles Wolff Packing company of Topeka, said the law in that respect was in conflict with the 14th amendment and deprived the company of its liberty of contract without due process of law.

FISHING TRIP IS AID TO DEMPSEY

Training Is Resumed for Coming Battle in Shelby on July Fourth

GREAT FALLS, Mont., June 11.—Refreshed by a day's trout fishing in the Rocky mountain trout streams 60 miles west of here, Jack Dempsey returned to camp tonight ready to resume training for his championship contest with Tommy Gibbons at Shelby, Mont., the boom town, on July 4.

The cut over the champion's left eye, opened as a result of a butt last Wednesday is healing so rapidly that Dempsey probably will be able to resume boxing either tomorrow or Wednesday. The cut opened up an old wound Dempsey sustained in Atlantic City while training for his contest with Georges Carpentier two years ago. It is at the upper edge of the left eye brow and about an inch long.

Physicians removed the two stitches yesterday, but the wound still is a vivid red and Dempsey will not risk the boxing gloves until it is completely healed.

OLDER GOLFERS LEAD AT TROON

Even Hundred Show Cards of 79 or Under; 222 Trying to Qualify

TROON, June 11.—(By The Associated Press.)—Age, personal and national put youth behind today in the first of the struggle of 222 golfers to qualify for participation in the British open championship.

In the first instance, the old golfers of England led the younger generation as represented by the American invaders and in the second instances golfers of old England for a day at least did better on the links than their rivals from young America.

Today an even hundred players slipped in cards of 79 or under while 136 men did better than Hagen. The best the Yankees could do was 75 and this was by Eugene Sarazen, American open champion and MacDonald Smith of California. Between them and the leader stood eight golfers.

Four other Americans, Leo Diegel, Tommy Armour, Charles Hoffman and Frank Clark were among the hundred whose cards were in the 70's while 80 was shared by George Aubach, Jim Barnes and Johnny Farrell.

Former Giant Pitcher Is Driven Out of Box

CHICAGO, June 11.—(National.)—Jess Barnes, former Giant pitcher, made his debut for Boston today and was driven out in the fifth by Chicago. Tim McNamara, who succeeded Barnes, met a similar fate in the seventh, the locals winning their sixth consecutive victory 10 to 3.

Vagrant Yellow River Be Put Back in its Course

PEKING, June 12.—The Yellow river, China's most treacherous waterway, which caused incalculable damage when it broke its banks two years ago and made a new channel, is to be returned to its original course. Fourteen thousand laborers are engaged in the building of dykes, and it is expected soon to increase the number to 20,000.

W. H. Mallory, executive secretary of the China International Famine Relief Commission, estimated the cost of corralling the Yellow river at \$1,500,000 Chinese currency, of which sum the finance commission of the government relief bureau has provided \$360,000.

Hundreds of square miles of territory north of the old river bed in the vicinity of Kung Chia Pa was flooded during the spring of 1921 by the breaking of a dyke and thousands of families were made homeless. Since then the district has been only sparsely repopulated, due to fear of a recurrence of the catastrophe.
