Homestead Lands Opened To Ex-Vets By 6 States

WASHINGTON, June 14.—More than 250,000 acres of public land in six western states were ordered thrown open today by the interior department for Homestead entry to former service men of the world war. Exact dates for the filing of entries will be announced by the land office in the various states.

The tracts include 3,800 acres in Fresno county, Cal., near Riverdale; 33,000 acres in Montezuma county, Colo., near Durango; 64,500 acres in Power county, Idaho, near American Falls; 37,500 acres in Phillips county, near Landusky and Ferguson county, near Winfield, Mont., 12,800 acres in Teton county, Mont.; 44,000 acres in Emery county, near Ferrion in Wayne county, near Torrey, and in Millard county, near Clear Lake, Utah; 59,000 acres in Carbon county, near Savary and in Hot Springs county, near Thermopolis, Wyo.

NEW CORPORATIONS

Mill Production 23 Per Cent Over Normal

One hundred and thirty-three mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending June 9, manufactured 110,953,207 feet of lumber; 241,974,673 feet, and shipped 150,941,585 feet.

Production for reporting mills was 23 per cent above normal. New business was 12 per cent below production. Shipments were 14 per cent above new business.

Forty-one per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to \$9,952,674 feet, of which 28,230,842 feet was for domestic cargo delivery, and 11,721,832 feet export. New business by rail amounted to 3721 cars.

Thirty-eight per cent of the week's lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 41,177,238 feet, of which 34,056,778 feet moved eastward and inter-coastal, and 8,120,462 feet overseas. Rail shipments totaled 2128 cars.

Local auto and team deliveries totaled 4,934,847 feet. Unfilled domestic cargo orders total 161,644,690 feet. Unfilled export orders, 35,964,167 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders, 7363 cars.

In the first 23 weeks of the year production reported to West Coast Lumbermen's association has been 2,459,619,346 feet; new business, 2,408,458,023 feet; and shipments 2,512,110,705 feet.
