## KEARNS WILL ACCEPT \$50,000 ALLOTMENT

GREAT FALLS, Mont., June 15.—(By the Associated Press.)—At 11 o'clock tonight the indications were that Jack Kearns, manager of Jack Dempsey, would accept \$50,000 under the agreement that the remaining \$50,000 of the \$100,000 of the installment, due today, be paid within a week. Mayor James A. Johnson of Shelby, personally raised \$50,000 and the remaining \$50,000 will be paid by a group of Great Falls bankers if the decision is agreed upon finally.

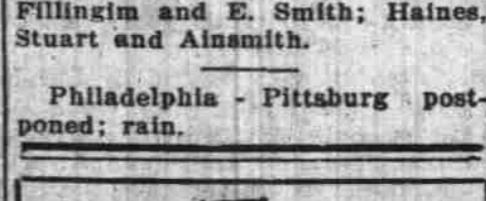
