DEMPSEY'S MANAGER MADE HAPPY; DRAFT FOR \$100,000 HELD

GREAT FALLS, Mont., June 16.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Jack Dempsey-Tom Gibbons heavyweight fight, sagging at the knees and ready to collapse, was shoved back on its feet tonight with new executives in charge and Jack Kearns, manager of the heavyweight champion, happy with the receipt of a \$100,000 draft, the second installment due Dempsey on his \$300,000 guarantee.

The fight will be staged as scheduled in Shelby, the cow town, before the sun sinks in the west on Fourth of July afternoon.

Payment of the \$100,000 to Kearns was made by George H. Stanton, president of the Stanton Trust and Savings bank, shortly before 8 o'clock tonight in the offices of the banking institution. Kearns accepted the money with offers in his pocket to take the match elsewhere but he declared he wanted to go through with the fight at Shelby at any cost.

Kearns had received an offer from Tom O'Rourke, matchmaker of the Polo Grounds Athletic club in New York; from Tex Rickard, and from promoters in Uniontown, Pa., who he said with a smile, wanted the match to be staged in connection with the speedway automobile races scheduled there.

While Kearns was considering these Great Falls business men notified Kearns that the \$100,000 was ready to be turned over to him in accordance with the agreement reached in the conference last midnight.

BASEBALL WAR GOES ON APACE

Wrigley, Chewing Gum
Magnet's Note, Is Admitted in Evidence

LOS ANGELES, June 16.—Controlling interest in the Seattle baseball club was purchased by Charles Lockard and Wade Killifer with money borrowed from funds of the Santa Catalina Island company, and obtained from Los Angeles banks on a note endorsed by William Wrigley, Jr., principal owner of that company and part owner of the Los Angeles baseball club.

This was testified today by Killifer and Lockard in the taking of depositions asked by the defense in a suit brought by the Seattle club in an effort to compel William H. McCarthy, president of the Pacific Coast Baseball league, to recognize Lockard as director for Seattle.

Harry I. Stafford, attorney for the league, drew from Lockard an admission that neither he nor Killifer had a cent of money invested in the deal at the time the purchase was made except that obtained through the loan and note. The loan has not been repaid, but Lockard testified that he had assigned an interest in an oil lands tract to the Santa Catalina Island company, which is of sufficient value to cover the loan of \$10,000.

The note endorsed by Wrigley was for \$125,000. This was made March 16, last it was testified and was to run 30 days. Early in April, however, Lockard and Killifer replaced it with a note for the same sum due April 16, endorsed by Robert Killifer, cousin of Wade, and W. D. Hubbard, a friend of Lockard. This note was cancelled May 11. Lockard said, but the cancellation was dated back to April 6. A third note was made on May 11, signed by Lockard and Wade Killifer and secured with their stock in the Seattle club, for which Lockard testified they paid \$100,000.

Both the Wrigley and the Killifer-Hubbard notes were admitted in evidence.

Yale Defeats Harvard in 31st Annual Track Meet

NTW HAVEN, Conn., June 16.—Yale easily defeated Harvard in their 31st annual track and field meet at Yale field today. Yale scored 11 first places in the 15 events, piling up 89½ points, while Harvard gathered a total of 45½ points. Yale had eight second places, while the Crimson was first in four events and second in seven.

U. OF W. CREW VICTORS

MADISON, Wis., June 16.—The University of Washington crew gave evidence of strength that is expected to give it a leading place in the national regatta later this month, when it defeated the University of Wisconsin eight by 5 lengths on Lake Mendota this afternoon, rowing the 2½ mile course in 13 minutes and 18 seconds and leading the Badgers all the way after the half mile mark.

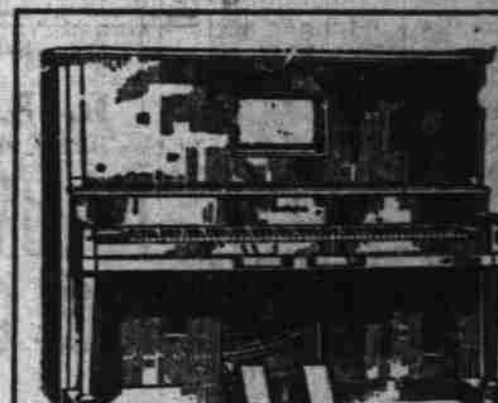
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
