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RAIN FALLS IN SHELBY SECTOR
BOTH CAMPS WORKING HARD
JAZZ MUSIC HELP TO FIGHTER

GREAT FALLS, Mont., June 19.—(By the Associated Press.)—A heavy rainstorm of all day duration forced Jack Dempsey, who already is suffering from a slight cold to work out today in the old dance pavilion, converted into an indoor gymnasium at his camp and to forego his usual run over the hills.

The champion indulged in a workout equivalent to ten rounds of boxing six rounds with a trio of sparring partners before running back through the rain to his living quarters for ten minutes of calisthenics and a brisk rub down. Critics agreed that Jack Burke, the Pittsburgh light-heavyweight discovered one weakness in Dempsey's defense which today make him an easy target for one of Tom Gibbons' punches, a ripping left hook to the stomach. Burke hit Dempsey solidly in the pit of the stomach as he came tearing in close. The St. Paul challenger, who is much faster than Burke, and a more accurate hitter, uses this blow, with a right cross, very effectively hooking it to the body after a feint to the head.

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VILLA IS SEEKING
ANOTHER VICTIM

Manager Laying Plans for
Flyweight Bout in New
York in September

NEW YORK, June 19.—Plans are already under way, according to Tom O'Rourke, Polo Grounds matchmaker for another world's flyweight title bout, bringing together Pancho Villa, the new champion who toppled Jimmy Wilde from the throne last night, and Frankie Genaro of New York, who won the American 112-pound crown from the Filipino last March. Villa had signed a contract for the match, which O'Rourke plans to stage about September 1.

Though still weak and bruised from the terrific punishment he absorbed in losing his title to Villa, Wilde was declared today by physicians to be in no danger from his injuries. Propped in bed in his Jersey City quarters, the little Welshman, who was hailed by critics as one of the gamiest battlers of all time was able to receive a few of his close friends.

Wilde's left eye was closed, his right eye nearly so, and besides a gash on his cheek, a cut four in-

ches long on his chin caused by the force of which he plunged to the canvas from Villa's knockout blow in the seventh round.

Revised figures today on the championship bout announced by promoters placed the paid attendance at 23,000 and receipts at \$94,590, considerably below the totals of 40,000 for the crowd and \$160,000 for the receipts as estimated last night.

On the basis of the new figures, Wilde's share 37 1/2 percent was about \$36,000, and Villa's 12 1/2 percent amounted to \$12,000.

Californian Is Named
Dean of U. of O. Women

EUGENE, Or., June 19.—Mrs. Virginia Judy Esterly of Berkeley, Cal., has been chosen as dean of women at the University of Oregon to take the place of Mrs. Elizabeth Fox DeCoe, resigned, according to announcement at the administration offices today. This summer Mrs. Esterly is acting dean of women at the summer session of the University of California.

Clatsop Prosecutor
Hasn't Made Request

A few days ago, Governor Walter M. Pierce received a letter from J. O. Erickson, district attorney for Clatsop county, saying that complaint had been made of his administration of his office, and that the matter might be

brought before the grand jury for investigation. He asked that the governor might be ready to appoint a special prosecutor, if he should call for such action from the state chief executive.

Governor Pierce replied by letter, saying that while the matter of appointing such a special prosecutor was not obligatory upon him, if the Clatsop officials should file a definite request for such an appointment he would consider the case on its merits. This leaves the case approximately where, for no formal request for such appointment has been made, and the governor couldn't appoint until it is.

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
