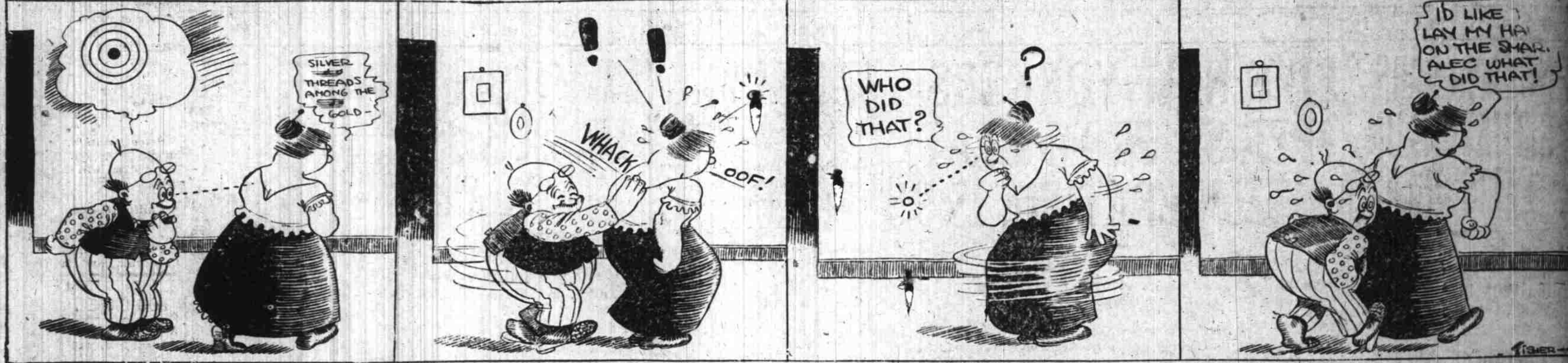

"To get such a record of regularity and punctuality," said Mr. Churchill, "the boys and girls must not only enjoy good health, but they must appreciate fully the advantages which the schools bring and must exercise courage and determination and perseverance in order not to let anything interfere with their at-

tending school and getting there on time.

"Few records that can be made are more unmistakable evidence of self-direction and resoluteness in the establishment of habits of reliability and determination to carry through whatever is undertaken."

Reports received so far give 5201 public school pupils who have earned the certificates. Marion county leads with 396, while Jackson county is second with a total of 253.
