**Supplies Cheaper**—Opening of bids for supplies at state institutions for the second half of the present year shows a decrease in many of the staple commodities, but an increase in canned goods. Best is quoted in the lowest bid at \$7.95 a hundred, while six months ago when bids were opened for the first half of the year the figure was \$9.34. Mutton is quoted now at \$6.94, as compared with \$7.94 six months ago. Bacon has decreased from \$20.70 a hundred to \$18.50, and ham from \$20.70 to \$20.20. Flour has dropped only slightly, from \$5.95 to \$5.45.

## 25 TEACHERS ARE DOING WORK HERE

### Summer School at Washington Building Employs Monmouth Instructors

Twenty-five teachers from the Oregon State normal at Monmouth and four expert critic teachers who are in general charge, are holding down the educational fort at Washington school for the summer school that is being conducted for the off-grade or the out-of-luck pupils who need to clean up some of their grades and some out even with the rest of their classes. The school started in Monday, with Miss Margaret Cooper in general charge. About 200 pupils are attending, most of them having moved and so fallen behind their grades during the year, or having been ill or in some way kept out of school so that they need some special attention. This is being given them in excellent manner, as the first summer school ever held for the grades in the Salem district. Work is being given in all the grades of the common school up to and including the eighth grade. As this is mostly corrective work, for those who have lagged behind the normal class, and as all class progress is measured by the speed of the slowest, it is believed that this will work wonders in the regular year's work in that it will bring the laggards up to or even slightly ahead of the others, so that all can start off with a bang.
