OKLAHOMA COWBOY SATISFIED
KNOCKED COLD IN 60 SECONDS
GIBBONS' SORE LIP IS BETTER

GREAT FALLS, Mont., June 22.—Jack Dempsey, world's heavy-weight champion, today wound up "Big Ben" Wray in less than sixty seconds after the Sayre, Okla., giant, with his seven feet, two inches of pugilistic ambitions spent four days traveling 2,000 miles to satisfy his craving to try himself out against the heavyweight champion.

Wray, a former cowboy and oil rigger down in Oklahoma, was stretched on the resined floor of the ring, completely knocked out, and with a possible fractured jaw, in less than a minute after he came out of his corner to box Dempsey, even against the best wishes of his manager, Tex McCarthy, an old-time heavyweight. The Oklahoma giant, weighing 250 pounds, proved to be an absolute novice with but courage and a desire to trade punches with the heavyweight champion. He came out to face Dempsey with his tongue extended, but with his right pressed tightly close to his chest, boxing timidly like a novice.

SHELBY, Mont., June 22.—The partially healed cold sores on Tommy Gibbons' lower lip were split open today and the challenger's mouth was bleeding when he ended his workout. Jimmy Delaney walloped Gibbons in the face, as they came out of a clinch and the sores which kept Gibbons from working out Wednesday were opened.

Gibbons was not bothered by the bleeding today and continued his sparring. He declared later that the sores would be entirely healed within a few days and probably would not be tender next week. Delaney's work against Gibbons this afternoon seemed to emphasize the challenger's footwork, his feinting ability and the strength of his quick left. He snapped the St. Paul fighter's head back several times with the left hook and drove a right cross to the body repeatedly.

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YALE'S OARSMEN
DEFEAT HARVARD

Undefeated Season Ended
With Clean Sweep; First
Win Since 1915

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 22.—(By the Associated Press.)—Sweeping to rowing glory that it has not known for nearly a decade, Yale's powerful varsity crew capped the climax of a remarkable come-back this season under American home-bred coaching methods, with a smashing, spectacular victory over Harvard as dusk was settling this evening over the picturesque Thames river course.

Flashing across the finish line fully six lengths ahead of a gallant but badly beaten Crimson eight, the blue shell closed its 1923 season with an undefeated record and gave the Eli's their first clean sweep since 1915 in the annual rowing struggle with their ancient rivals. Yale's time for the four miles was 22:10; Harvard's time, 22:35.
