**Some Meats Sell Today Cheaper Than in 1913**  
CHICAGO, June 21.—The recent announcement from one of the statistical bureaus of the United States government that the cost of living is approximately 67 per cent higher today than it was 10 years ago has brought a statement from F. W. Waddell, vice president of Armour & Co., to the effect that wholesale selling prices for meat are in some cases lower than they were in 1913, and in others at almost exactly the same level. Mr. Waddell submits the following prices based on an average of

the trading in May, 1913, and in others almost exactly the same in May, 1923.

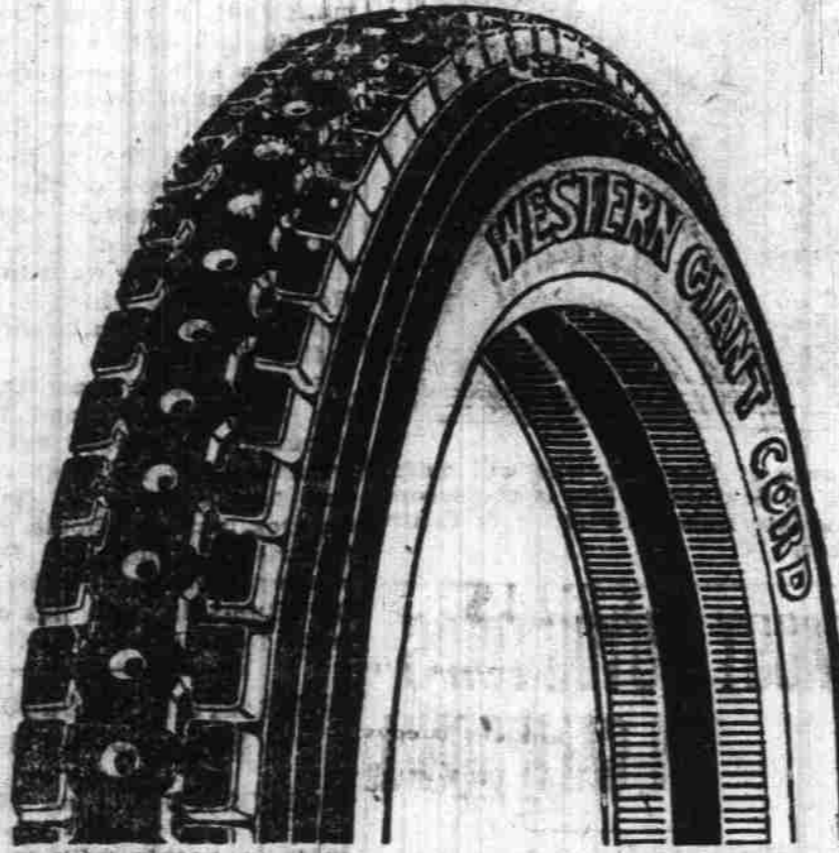
Pork loins, 1923, 16 3-4 cents, 1913, 14 1-2 cents; Boston butts, 1923, 12 1-2 cents, 1913, 12 1-2 cents; Spare ribs, 1923 8 cents, 1913, 10 cents; Beef carcasses, 1923, 13 cents, 1913 12 cents; Loose lard, 1923 10.18 cents, 1913 10.60 cents; Ham, 1923 21 cents, 1913 23 cents.

"It must be understood there are certain grades of products that sell for higher prices than those quoted, and other grades that sell at lower prices," says Mr. Waddell, "but the general standard of prices is just about on the level of 1913."

"In 1913 and in 1923 the average cost of hogs was about the same, but since 1913 the cost of

manufacturing live animals has increased materially and has the cost of distributing the finished product. The prices quoted above are to retailers. Retail prices vary according to the grades handled, and the average which a retailer gives to the householder."

**'Frisco Cops Guilty of Violating Volstead Act**  
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 21.—A verdict of guilty was returned late today by a federal grand jury in the case of Police Lieutenant D. H. Brasfield and William Barion, charged with conspiring to violate the Volstead act. The maximum punishment is a term of two years and a fine of \$10,000.
