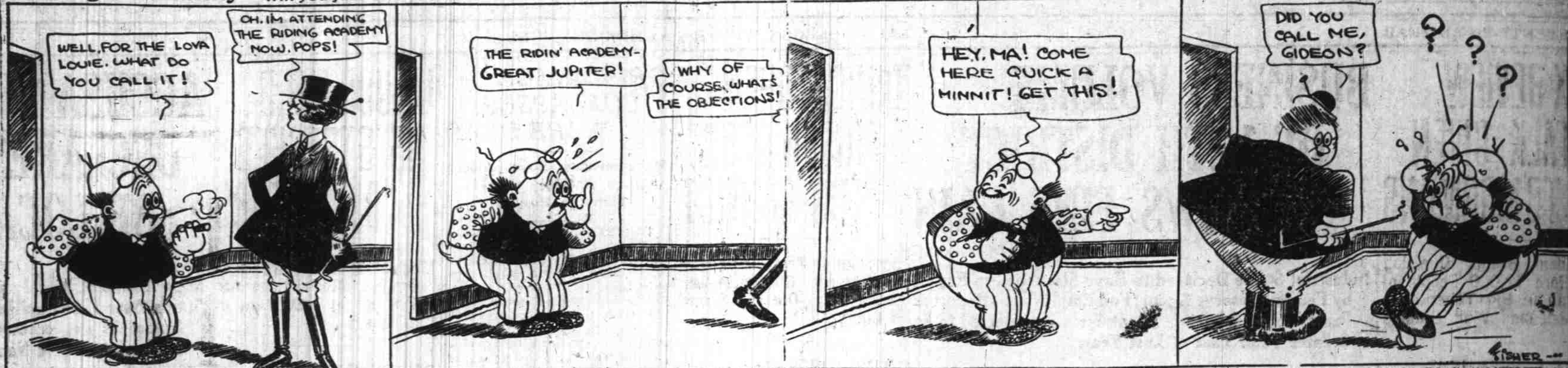

DEMPSEY'S FATHER PAYS VISIT

GREAT FALLS, June 26.—Jack Dempsey today launched into the final six days of training for his heavyweight championship battle with Tommy Gibbons at Shelby July 4.

After a day's rest Dempsey resumed his boxing in his outdoor gymnasium, stepping five lively rounds with a trio of light sparring partners in addition to punching the bag for three rounds and driving heavy swings into the leather dummy for a round. Everything considered, it was a highly satisfactory workout in the opinion of the champion's handlers.

After finishing with Wells the champion stepped a round with Bonnie Curry, a 115 pounder from Sioux City, Iowa, and then faced Lee Moore, a Los Angeles lightweight, for a round.

Hiram Dempsey, the champion's aged father, arrived in camp from his home in Salt Lake City while the title-holder was boxing and joined the spectators standing on the grassy slope leading to the ring. He proudly watched his son in action.

YMCA and Legion Will
Play for Championship

The very last of the championship series in the Twilight league is to be played tonight at Willamette field, when the YMCA and the American Legion teams come together for the pennant.

In addition, he is to have the Monmouth high school coaching work, so that he is the physical dictator of the whole community. Zeller was one of the fastest, most elusive half backs who ever appeared on an Oregon field. Back of a heavy, strong line that could give him adequate protection, he would have starred on any team on the coast. He received his diploma from Willamette this year.

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Leonard Suspension
Fails to Be Upheld

NEW YORK, June 26.—(By Associated Press.)—The first "overt act" of disagreement between New York and New Jersey boxing authorities occurred today when the state athletic commission declined to uphold the New Jersey Boxing commission's suspension of Benny Leonard, lightweight king, for failure to go through with a contract made last year to box Charley White, of Chicago.

The commission announced after a hearing that it found nothing in the White-Leonard contract, made with Tex Rickard, to prevent either boxer from engaging in other contests and thus cleared the way for the championship match scheduled at the Yankee stadium on July 23 between Leonard and Lew Tendler, of Philadelphia.

Validity of 10 Votes

BULLETIN—Spokane, June 26.—Validity of ten absentee votes in Lincoln county, counted for Charles F. Myers of Davenport in the results of the special primary election last Tuesday for the republican nomination for congressman from the fifth Washington district, will be contested by Thos. Corkery, he announced today. These ten votes gave Myers a lead of seven, on the face of complete official returns from the entire district.

Freak Fish Is Exhibited
At Fitts Salem Market

A skate-fish, three feet square and weighing 80 pounds, is being exhibited this week at the Fitts fish market on North Commercial street. It was shipped over from Newport for exhibition purposes only. It is not edible, or at least is not usually used for human food. The skate is practically square, and only about six inches thick at the thickest part. It swims with the mouth corner foremost, and with a three-foot tail like a cow's, it steers itself over the bounding main. The mouth is on the under side. It would have to lap over its food for seven inches to get a bite of anything. With the eyes a foot back of the front corner, on top, and the mouth several inches from the corner and on the under side, it can't see within a foot of where it is biting—and it oughtn't to be very formidable as a watchdog to bite holes in tramps' trousers.
