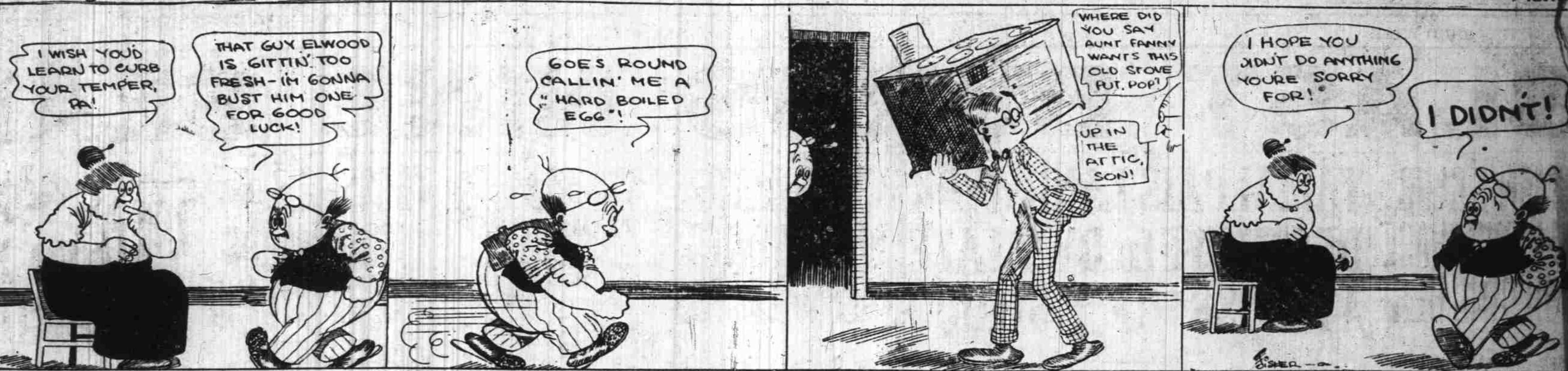

BATTLERS ARE AWAITING GONG WORKOUTS CEASE ON SATURDAY GIBBONS NOW "THUNDER CHIEF"

SHELBY, Mont., June 30.—(By The Associated Press.)—His outdoor ring fringed by a circle of more than 50 Blackfeet Indians and squaws, in picturesque regalia and war paint, Tommy Gibbons, newly-appointed "Thunder Chief" of the tribe, went through his daily war dance with his sparring partners today. It was one of the final workouts Gibbons will have before he clashes with Jack Dempsey here July 4. He boxed seven rounds, three of them fast and fierce, the others tame and sometimes comic. Tillie "Kid" Herman and Jimmy Delaney sent Gibbons into high speed and received the only severe punishment the challenger meted out today. Herman boxed only one two-minute round with the challenger, but it was the fastest two-minute round Gibbons has had in three weeks of training.

GREAT FALLS, Mont., June 30.—(By The Associated Press.)—Jack Dempsey reached the final stages of his training today without injury to his hands or the healed cut over his left eye when he boxed four light rounds, stepping two each with Jack Burke, the Pittsburg light-weight, and Billy Wells, the British welter-weight. Before pulling on the gloves the champion hammered the punching bag for a round and then jumped into the ring for a round of shadow boxing to get warmed up.

A sudden thundershower and hail storm, breaking over the champion's camp five minutes before he was ready to start his workout, drove him to the shelter of his indoor gymnasium, which was jammed to the doors. Dempsey perspired freely despite a chill wind that swept through the open sides of the building.

NEW YORK YANKS GET 3 STRAIGHT

League Lead Is Now Eight Complete Games—Pen-nock Pitches Well

NEW YORK, June 30.—The New York Americans made it three straight from Philadelphia here today, winning 6 to 1. The Yankees stretched the league lead to eight complete games. Pen-nock pitched a strong game for the Yankees, a fluke home run by Welch giving Philadelphia its only tally. Harris pitched well for the Athletics but New York pounded Hasty in the eighth, after Harris retired in favor of a pinch hitter.

Oaklander Declared to Be Best Right-Handed Pitcher in League

PORTLAND, Or., June 30.—Ray Kremer showed why he is considered by many baseball experts to be the best right-handed pitcher in the coast league when he had the Beavers swinging at space for eight innings, during which they managed to drive out only three safe ones, including a home run by Brazil. Censorship of Movies Established in Ireland

DUBLIN, June 30.—The Irish government is establishing a national censorship of cinema pictures. Hitherto managers have been carrying on such censorship as was provided in England, and many films were uncensored, but there was no uniformity and some public complaint of the exhibition of objectionable films.

The new censorship will supersede all others. Every film must be censored by the national censor, and the exhibition of any uncensored film will be punished by heavy penalties.

PORTLANDERS ARE COMING TO RACES

A., is coming as one of the officers for the races, and other Portland men, experienced in the game, will serve as timers and judges.

Two more fast cars that had not previously contracted, are coming as a result of this visit. One is the Dodge Special, the speedy little blue car that made such a fine race on June 9. It belongs to and will be driven by Walter Blume. Another is the Walker Special, a partially-Chevrolet racer that did not do itself justice in the last races, but that at its best is undeniably fast. The McDonald Frontenac-Ford was already promised, and will be here for a great race.

for car practice. The Salem cars have to drive to Independence as the nearest place to find a track. The Salem grounds will be open for only a very brief hour or two before the races.
