New Law Interpreted—
Under an act of the 1923 legislature standardizing threads on fire hose and hydrants in Oregon cities and towns, Attorney General Van Winkle rules that it is the duty of the state fire marshal to furnish the die for making the threads, but that the municipalities must bear the expense of having the threads standardized. The opinion was written in reply to an inquiry by Will H. Moore, state fire marshal.

Bonds Certified—
The state irrigation and drainage securities commission on Saturday certified \$10,000 additional bonds for the Middle Fork Irrigation District of Hood River county, a project using water from the middle fork of Hood river. The money is to be used to purchase water rights of some of the land owners in the district. Last January the commission certified \$55,000 bonds for the district to purchase the works of the Middle Fork Irrigation company. The project embraces about 7500 acres, of which about 3000 are now irrigated.
