DEMPSEY NOW TAKING REST

Title Holder Leaves for Salt Lake Where He Will Visit With His Mother

GREAT FALLS, Mont., July 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—Jack Dempsey, world's heavy-weight champion, tonight is starting out on a few days' vacation after a confining nine weeks' training grind for his championship battle with Tom Gibbons at Shelby yesterday. The titleholder, accompanied by his father, Jerry Lavattas, his faithful little trainer, Floyd Stannard, a nephew, and Mike Trant, a Chicago detective sergeant, left for Salt Lake to visit his mother before proceeding to Los Angeles.

The champion expects to be in New York by August 1, ready to resume training for a title match with either Harry Wills, the negro heavyweight, or the winner of the Luis Firpo-Jess Willard contest. Dempsey understands that Jack Kearns, his manager, already has opened negotiations for these bouts.

Dempsey was in high spirits for his departure, joking with the big crowd that came down to the station to see him off. His right eye was only slightly discolored and the cut over his left eye was starting to heal nicely. The champion bore no other marks as a result of his 15-round battle.

The training camp, in a patch of trees on the banks of the Missouri river, two miles from town, was deserted today. Bernard Dempsey, elongated brother of the champion, was the only other occupant. He shuffled from one room to another picking up the odds and ends of the equipment that must be packed and made ready so as to be available when Dempsey opens another training camp.

HIGHER STANDARD URGED BY DOCTOR

Universal Raise in Living Conditions Said Greatest Present Need

SAN FRANCISCO, July 5.—Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, head of Stanford University and president-elect of the American Medical association, told thousands of educators from all parts of the world, assembled tonight to the civic auditorium here, that the need of the world is a universal rise in the standards of living.

Dr. Wilbur impressed upon his audience, delegates to the National Education association convention, that development of the body is just as important as development of the mind.

"The future of human civilization depends primarily upon the erasing of the children," he asserted. "All plans for world harmony and for the development of that human cooperation requisite for the control of known and unknown forces must be forward-looking and be worked out by brains now immature and dependent for the most part upon the state of the bodies carrying them about. I see no way out of the present tangle in which the human race finds itself, except thru the education and physical care of the child."

Deaf Association Favors Abolishing Day-Schools

SPOKANE, Wash., July 5.—A resolution favoring the abolishment of all-day schools for the deaf and the diverting of funds now used by these institutions to the state school for the deaf at Vancouver, Wash., was passed by the convention of the Washington state association of the deaf in session here today.

The Vancouver school gives instruction in the sign language, scholastic subjects and training in the trades. Other schools teach only the oral method and lip-reading. For that reason it was recommended that the state institution take care of all the deaf of the state.

Thirty-Four Amateurs To Contest Golf Title

NEW YORK, July 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—Thirty-four amateurs are scattered among the 360 golf stars who will compete for the 1923 American open championship, beginning next Monday at the Inwood Country club on Long Island.

This was revealed tonight by the United States Golf association's list of pairings for the qualifying play on the first four days of the tournaments. Ninety contestants will tee off on each of the qualifying days, the best 18 and ties for last place each day gaining the right to keep in the 72-hole championship test Friday and Saturday.

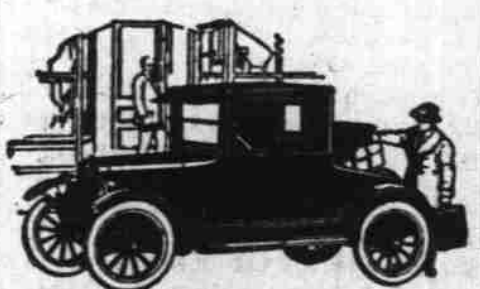

SPORTS WOMAN Woman Tennis Champion Shocks Crowd By Losing

WIMBLEDON, July 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—Mile Suzanne Lenglen at last has lost one of her many championships in tennis. She was forced this afternoon to give up her claim to the title on the mixed doubles championship of the world, and what is worse, she lost the honor in two straight sets. She and her partner, Jean Washer, the Belgian champion, were defeated 7-5, 6-3, in the semi-finals by the old tennis team, Randolph Lycett and Miss Elizabeth Ryan, veterans of many a four racquet contest. It has been so long since Suzanne stepped off the court a loser that

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her defeat with Washer came as a shock to the thousands in the stadium.
