GOOD SHOOTERS TO CAMP PERRY

Adjutant General White
Would Not Be Surprised
if Oregonians Win Prize

The Oregon national guard will send a delegation of crack shots to the great military tournament at Camp Perry this year, according to Adjutant General George A. White.

Each military organization will hold its own private elimination match, to pick a team to send to the Clackamas range the latter part of August to contest for the state team honors. From the high men at this state shoot the team will be chosen to go east. Oregon has usually been able to make a good showing in the national events. Some of the years the Webfoot team has come close to the top. It is not known just what will be developed this year. There has been so much new material brought into the guard and these new men may prove to be either exceptionally or even more than ordinarily bad—but the records thus far indicate that they will run high rather than low.

The Oregon guard is generally considered to have made an exceptionally good showing at the Camp Lewis maneuvers. With the experienced officers and non-coms mostly men who saw service in the World war, the organization has been able to establish a new record for efficiency. Arriving at the camp the Oregon units established their camps, drew their rations from the quartermaster, set up all their cooking and camp equipment, and served dinner within two hours of their arrival. Their camp service was considered the model of the whole encampment.

No prizes were issued this year because of the sometimes prevalent grouch among the defeated units that might have stressed particular branches of military excellence that did not appeal so strongly to judges as the goodness of other units. The general comment, however, around the camp showed where the winners were, and Oregon came home with a broad smile over the gossip concerning its military excellences.

SHELBY PICTURES HIT NEW YORK MOVIE MAN DISGUISED AS VENDOR FILM DON'T SHOW ACTUAL BATTLE

NEW YORK, July 6.—First pictures of the Dempsey-Gibbons fight to reach New York arrived at the Minceo flying field today in two airplanes. W. C. Smith who arrived first, completed the trip from Shelby, Mont., in about 43 hours. Smith left Chicago at 7:45 today, where he relieved Dallas M. Speer.

Another machine piloted by James Ray arrived at the flying field at 8 o'clock tonight with films for a newspaper reel which it was said, a Broadway Garden roof promised to show at midnight.

Ray's time from Chicago was given as eight hours and 45 minutes. The pictures he brought were said by a representative of a film company, to have been taken by cameramen disguised as peanut vendors. Small cameras were concealed in their baskets of peanuts and 100 feet of film were run off at a time, he said.

Federal agents inspected the pictures on arrival at the flying field and passed them after they were found to conform to requirements of the law. The motion picture films did not show actual fighting.

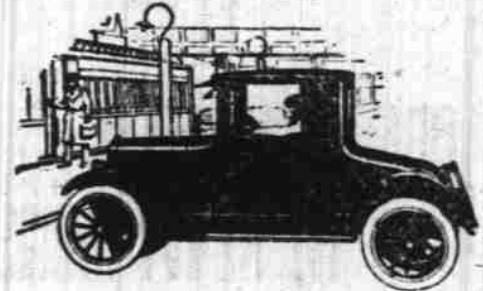

1920, and is ready to start its mission."

Party Repudiated

"The workers' party packed the convention, steam-rollered the conference and stole our name," Buck declared, "but we are the stronger for it. When one of a group mingles with another there never can be cooperation toward political unity by lawful means. We are rid of hidden guns."

The repudiation of the federated party came shortly after the reading of a communication from

President Brophy of District No. 1, United Mine Workers of America, which said his organization could not deal with the federated party, "because it has a philosophy contrary to the principles we are fighting for."

Chester C. Platt, secretary of the Wisconsin Non-partisan league, again said that "his radical state of Wisconsin could not accept the federated platform," but "now that you have cleaned the red's out of the Farmer-Labor party there is an organization with which we can affiliate."
