FLAX IS LEAVING
FROM HEAVY RAIN

Sunshine, However, Will
Straighten Straws—Seed
Production Big

Fred Bradley of Aumsville, one of the big flax growers of the valley, reports that the recent rain has given the heavy flax enough of a slant that a good sharp wind might drive it clear down and make harvesting difficult.

The flax is bearing a heavier seed crop this year, than any other year since flax became a real farm crop in the Willamette valley, and because the heads were so heavy the rain put them down almost to the ground. He believes that a few days of good sunshine will restore the crop to its earlier promised perfection, and make flax the best paying industry of the valley. The rains have given the fibre a wonderful growth. Much of the flax will classify even above the highest normal length standard.

Mr. Bradley brought in to the Statesman office some hemp from the Lake Labish country that stands seven feet in height. It is grown on the peat land, and should produce some of the finest hemp ever produced. Hemp is a close cousin to the flax in the treatment for market, and the big Willamette Valley Flax and Hemp association considered the two of almost equal value in forming their association and urging their growth. The hemp grows best in a soil like the Lake Labish peat bogs. It is not an upland farm crop as is the flax.

Montana Prohi Men Are
Silent Recent Ruling

HELENA, Mont., July 7.—Pending a study of the decision of Federal Judge George A. Bourquin in the case of Dr. J. B. Freund of Butte, prohibition enforcement officers declined today to make a statement as to its effect on enforcement in Montana. The decision does not affect the handling of whiskey in drug stores as to quantity permissible to keep on hand or the method of issuing it, is said, but simply holds that physician cannot be dictated to by law as to the number of alcohol prescriptions they write or quantity prescribed for a patient.

Judge Bourquin in his decision pointed out ways of enforcing the regulations to check abuses of the use of alcohol without interfering with the rights of physician and patient.
