WILLARD AND FIRPO WAIT THURSDAY
FIGHTERS DECLARED TO BE IN FINE TRIM
HUGE ADVANCE DEMAND FOR TICKETS

NEW YORK, July 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—Completing their training programs and with light exercise needed during the next two days to keep them on edge, Jess Willard, former heavyweight champion, and Luis Angel Firpo, South American slugger, were declared tonight by their handlers to be ready for the battle at Boyle's Thirty Acres Thursday night.

The end of the conditioning grind brought with it a marked swing in sentiment among boxing experts toward Willard, the forty-year-old Kansan, who is attempting one of the most unusual come-backs in prize ring history. When the match first was made, after Willard had knocked out Floyd Johnson and Firpo eliminated Jack McAuliffe II, at the Milk Fund show two months ago, critics established Firpo as an odds-on favorite.

Ticket sales continued today to exceed all expectations, thousands obtaining the pasteboards at Madison Square Garden and sending

the advance "gate" beyond \$300,000.

In his final ring workout today Willard went eight rounds, boxing three rounds with Chief Metagua, his Indian sparring partner, and then shadow boxing, punching the bag and handling the medicine ball for five more.

Firpo did no ring work but Jimmy De Forest, his trainer, spent an hour perfecting the big fellow's left jab. The punch, in addition to the powerful right, that has felled most of Firpo's opponents, will fortify his attack, De Forest believes.

McAuliffe, who has been training with Firpo, also wound up his active work. He will box Johnson in a 12-round semi-final match Thursday night. The latter has been training at Saratoga.

A special set of boxing gloves for Firpo and Willard was received today by Rickard from a San Francisco manufacturer. They were said to be the largest ever made for a single bout.

DEMPSEY REFUSES
TO NAME WINNER

Says Firpo Will Have to
Whip Willard Within 6
Rounds If He Wins

LOS ANGELES, July 10.—Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion, arrived in Los Angeles today for a two weeks' visit with relatives and friends. He said he was "feeling fine" and that he was ready to meet any one his manager, Jack Kearns, picked for him.

Dempsey said he was sorry he would be unable to attend the bout between Jess Willard and Luis Angel Firpo at Jersey City, Thursday night. However, he said, Kearns would be at the ringside.

Dempsey refused to try to pick the winner of the Willard-Firpo bout and said he never attempts to guess the winner of matches where the principals are possible contenders for the championship. However, he did say he believed Firpo would have to beat Willard inside of five or six rounds if he expected to win.

"I understand the eastern experts are picking Firpo," said the champion. "Well, to my mind the South American will have to win in a hurry if he beats that huge Kansan. If Firpo does not beat Willard in five or six rounds, I do not think he will win at all. Willard is a pretty smart old fighter and the longer a man goes with him the better the Man Mountain gets."

"My bout with Tommy Gibbons taught me one thing and that is that I must keep fighting. No more long lay-offs for me. It makes no difference whether Kearns signs Harry Wills, Willard or Firpo to box me. They all look alike to me—but I want to fight one of them on Labor Day."

COMES OUT TRUE

Golf Player From Antipodes
Plays All Night in His
Sleep at Inwood

INWOOD, N. Y., July 10.—(By the Associated Press.)—All last night Joe Kirkwood, a droll sort of fellow from the Antipodes, golfed in his sleep. He strolled across green fairways, driving little white balls with deadly accuracy. On the greens he sank long putts. Sometimes he encountered traps, but pitched from close to the cups. Just before sleep left him this morning he walked across adjoining beds into the Inwood club dormitory, dreaming he was pushing his way through a large cheering gallery.

The dream came true today in the second qualifying round for the national open championship. With Jess Sweetser, amateur champion, for a partner, Kirkwood played a perfect game on his two trips over the course, turning in a card of 144. He was around in the morning in 70, two under par, and his afternoon card was 74, two above. He was 10 strokes better than any other of the other 18 who finished within the limit of 159 to qualify.

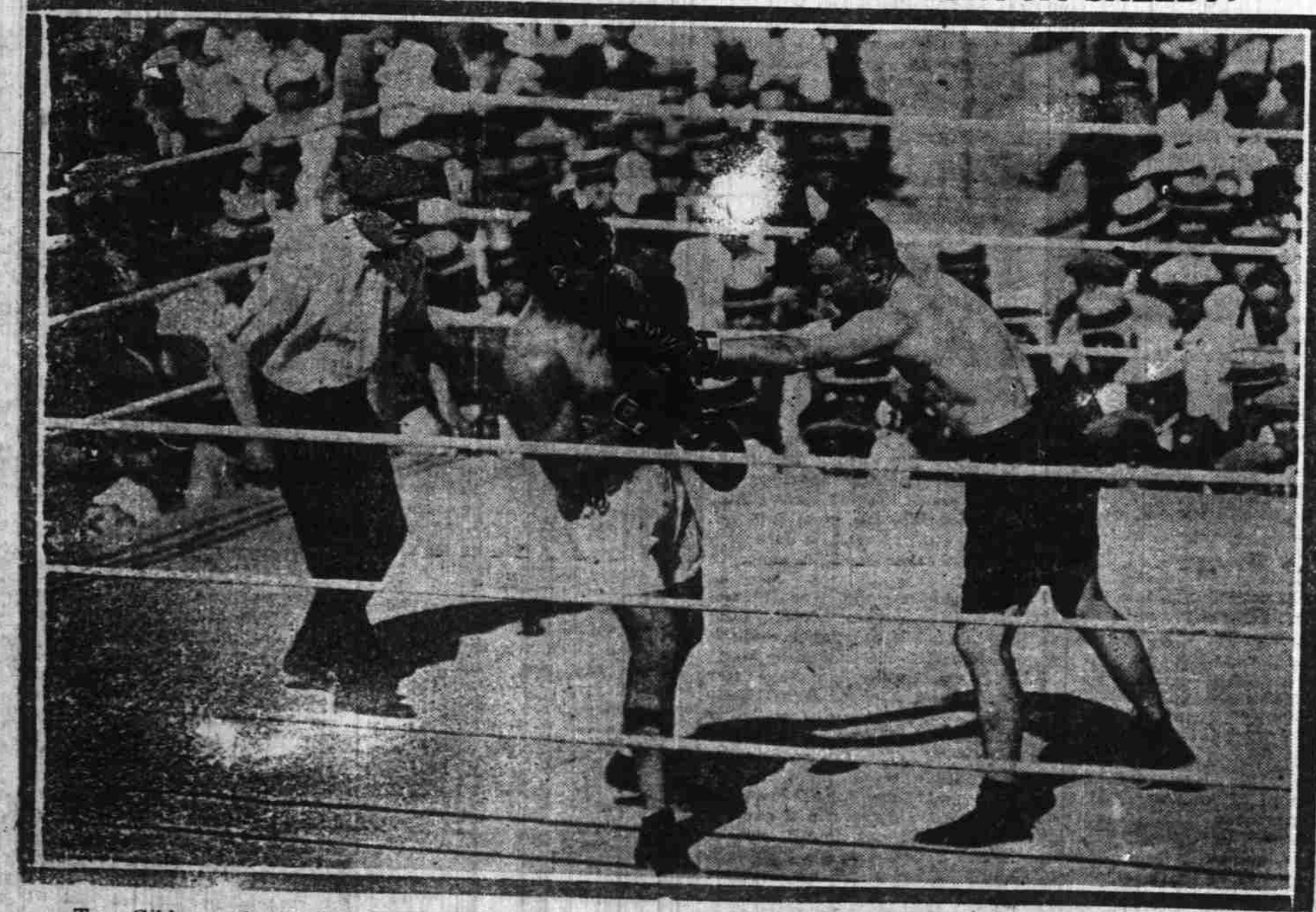
