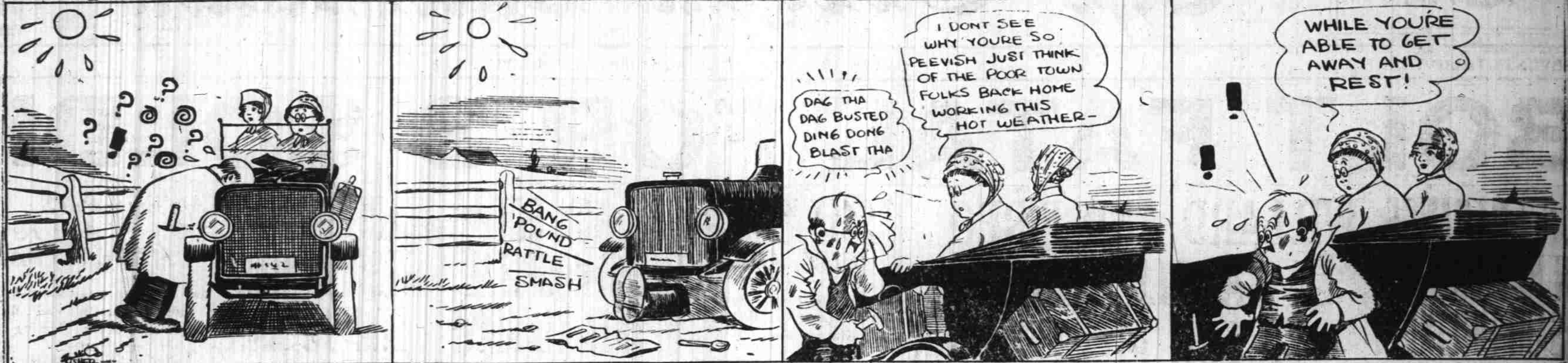

MacDonald Smith Leads In Third Day at Inwood

INWOOD, N. Y., July 11.—(By the Associated Press.)—MacDonald Smith, bray Scot of San Francisco, whose great comeback to golfing fame in the British open championship at Troon last month when he finished within two strokes of the title winner, gave him a place among the world stars and led the third day qualifying field for the American open championship over the Inwood Country club links today with a card of 150. With Walter Hagen, the

American expert, as a partner Smith played a brilliant game around the 36 holes. Hagen, little off his game, took 79 in the morning but he negotiated the first nine of the afternoon round in 36, one under par. On the nine Hagen was the master putter and it helped him into the qualifying fold. Twenty of the 92 starters scored 15 or better enough to qualify them. Only one amateur of the six in the field qualified. He was Frank Dyer of Upper Montclair, N. J., metropolitan and New Jersey state champion. Perfect golfing weather favored the third day of the field.

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
