Senator McNary sent the telegram after receiving a communication from William A. Gausden, assistant manager of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, protesting at the failure of the appropriation committee to include an Oregon port on its Itinerary. Senator McNary sent the follow-

ing telegram to Admiral Coontz: "From advice at hand it appears that naval appropriation committee has not included Astoria and Portland in its itinerary. The omission of visit to these Oregon cities would prevent a thorough study of the subject of national defense. As you will accompany committee I urge you that your schedule be so altered as to give proper time to survey of conditions at Astoria and Portland. The location of Astoria, the easy entrance to its harbor and short distance from practice grounds makes it an ideal base from which de-
