WASHINGTON, July 14.—A problem in naval courtesy has been presented to the department by Capt. E. T. Pollock, governor of American Samoa, and is now awaiting the consideration of a yet unfound Solomon.

What action is proper, Capt. Pollock wants to know, when the navy regulations order a specified salute to an official of a foreign government, and that official urgently requests that it be withheld?

Entering the harbor of Tonga, a native insular kingdom 500 miles southwest of Samoa, Capt. Pollock found resident there a British consul who at the same time was deputy commissioner of the British Colonial Office. As a consul he "rated" 7 guns, as a colonial agent 11 guns. Capt. Pollock indicated that he was willing to shoot the maximum in the interests of binational comity, but was informed courteously, yet firmly, that the British government had the question of which salute was proper under consideration, and the resident would be pleased if the matter could be held in abeyance until a decision was reached.

No salute was fired, but Capt. Pollock made a report indicating that the problem was a new one even to an officer of his long experience.

NAVY COMMITTEE ASKED TO VISIT McNary Urges Delegation From Washington Not to Overlook Oregon

A disposition on the part of the naval appropriation committee to slight Oregon on the itinerary when viewing harbors of the Pacific coast, and to jump from San Francisco to Puget Sound after entering several California ports, has caused Senator McNary to send a telegram to Admiral Cootz at Washington, who is to accompany the party, urging that stops be made at Astoria and Portland.

Senator McNary sent the telegram after receiving a communication from William A. Gausden, assistant manager of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, protesting at the failure of the appropriation committee to include an Oregon port on its itinerary.

Senator McNary sent the following telegram to Admiral Cootz: "From advice at hand it appears that naval appropriation committee has not included Astoria and Portland in its itinerary. The omission of visit to these Oregon cities would prevent a thorough study of the subject of national defense. As you will accompany committee I urge you that your schedule be so altered as to give proper time to survey of conditions at Astoria and Portland. The location of Astoria, the easy entrance to its harbor and short distance from practice grounds makes it an ideal base from which de-

stroyers may operate. Portland is the base of large commercial activities by water and harbor conditions there and along the Columbia river should be carefully noted. Sincerely hope that I may have wire indicating inclusion of these cities in itinerary."
