FIRPO - DEMPSEY GO MAY BE ARRANGED FOR BUENOS AIRES

NEW YORK, July 16.—(By Associated Press.)—The heavyweight boxing outlook took an unexpected turn late today when Promoter Tex Rickard announced a definite proposal to stage a title match between Jack Dempsey, the champion, and Luis Angel Firpo in the capital of the latter's native Argentina, Buenos Aires, about November 1.

Firpo, keenly anxious to fight for the highest of fistic honors before his countrymen, already has accepted Rickard's terms. Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, discussed the details of the proposal with Rickard this afternoon and at the end of the conference told the promoter his answer would be ready by Wednesday.

Rickard said his plan to take the fight out of this country was prompted by two reasons—Firpo's desire to return to his native country for the bout, and enthusiastic reports from the promoter's agents as to the possibilities of financial success in the "Paris of South America."

Rickard has had representatives in Argentina for some time but just after Firpo's knockout victory over Jess Willard at Boyle's Thirty Acres a few days ago, he intimated he had abandoned the project in South America because of the probable risk involved. However, he received cable advice today that helped alter his mind, one of them from Juan Homas, a personal agent, saying that a fight between Firpo and either Dempsey or Harry Wills, negro contender would draw more than 2,000,000 pesos—about \$800,000 in the Argentine capital.

Exact Terms Dark
The exact nature of his offer to Kearns was not revealed but it was believed it would embrace a percentage proposition that would assure the champion and his manager close to \$500,000.

Kearns, meanwhile, declared he was desirous of arranging, if possible two matches for the champion in this country this year instead of going to South America. Kearns said he would prefer to have Dempsey meet Firpo first around Labor day, and then if victorious, take on Wills, just before the world's series in October. Rickard has Firpo bound to an iron-clad contract, however. He is not especially interested now in promoting a Wills-Dempsey or Wills-Firpo match. He believes the logical bout is between the title holder and the Argentine.

Kearns also has had an offer from Jimmy Johnston, matchmaker for the Yankee stadium, for a Wills-Dempsey contest around Labor day, but the champion's manager has not acted upon it. "We're ready to fight," Kearns said summing up his views. "We want two matches this year, one with Firpo and another with Wills. I am anxious to have them in that order. I'm willing to sign for both with one or separate promoters. For our share I'll want 50 per cent of the gate."

CHICAGO WHEAT NOW UNDER \$1

Every Future Delivery Goes at Low Figure and Close of Market Heavy

CHICAGO, July 16.—Every future delivery of wheat sold today at less than \$1 a bushel, the first occasion since 1914 that the December delivery has done so at this time of the year. Increasing arrivals of newly harvested wheat were largely responsible for the fresh setback in values.

The market closed heavy, 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 cents net lower, with September 96 1/2 to 96 3/4 cents, and December, 93 3/4 to 93 1/2 cents. Corn finished unchanged to 1/2 cent off; oats, 1/2 to 3/4 cent down and provisions varying from 15 cents decline to 5 cents advance.

Persistent hedging, sales, together with much enlarged country offerings of wheat to arrive here had a decidedly bearish effect on the wheat market almost from the outset and soon resulted in new low price records for the season. Weakness in the Liverpool market, together with pessimism brought about by Premier Poincare's talk concerning relations with Germany tended also to act as weight on values, notwithstanding French denials that his statements were to be looked upon as reflecting in advance the plans to be proposed by Great Britain to settle the Ruhr problem.

Buying failed to broaden sufficiently to absorb the increased offerings in the wheat market here, and export demand at the seaboard was said to be poor, only 300,000 bushels being acknowledged to have been sold abroad.

FIREMAN KILLED IN TRAIN WRECK

Washout Near Green River Throws 16 Cars, Two Engines, in Ditch

GREEN RIVER, Wyo., July 16.—One fireman of a doubleheader eastbound Union Pacific freight train was killed today when the engines were wrecked and 16 cars derailed as the result of a washout of trackage two miles west of Bitter creek near here.

More than 300 yards of track had been washed out at the scene of the wreck, following a terrific cloudburst which struck this section last night. The fireman who lost his life had leaped from the locomotive and was buried under the wreckage. His body had not been recovered tonight.

The derailed train, loaded with fruit, crashed through fence posts and tore down telephone poles along the right of way for a distance of 60 feet. The name of the dead fireman was not known here late last night.

WHEAT CROP IS REPORTED SHORT

Yield in State of Washington Not Expected to Exceed 50,000,000

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 16.—Prediction that wheat yield in Washington this year will not exceed 50,000,000 bushels was made by John P. Duke, state supervisor of banking, today upon his return from a 1,650 mile trip through eastern Washington, where he interviewed bankers and growers. This is 9,000,000 bushels less than was estimated by the federal statistician at Spokane as of July 1. Mr. Duke based his lower estimate on reported shrinkage in production in Whitman, Walla Walla and Garfield counties from smut, fallen wheat in eastern Whitman county as a result of heavy rains, and hot weather in Adams county.

"In spite of the lower price of wheat this year, the banks in eastern Washington will be able to pay off their borrowed money and their redemptions," Duke said.

"I don't anticipate any trouble in financing this year's crop. There will be a good demand for farmers will cooperate in harvesting labor at a fair wage, but the far the grain and reduce to some extent the labor necessary."

Mr. Duke remarked that an outstanding feature this year is that farmers are meeting their expenses by selling milk, eggs and home products.

NEW YORK, July 16.—The sugar market was much more active today with general advances noted in both raw and refined. Fully 175,000 bags of raw sugar were purchased by refiners at ranging from 5 1/4 to 5 1/2 for Cubas. One refinery advanced fine granulated to 9 cents, and all others to 8.75, against 8.50 at the close of the week. An increased demand for refined was reported for the buying movement. Futures were strong at 12 to 29 points net higher.
