FIRPO-DEMPSEY SITE UNDECIDED

Managers No Nearer Agreement as Result of Consultation Wednesday

NEW YORK, July 18.—(By the Associated Press.)—Tex Rickard's efforts to sign, seal and deliver the proposed Jack Dempsey-Firpo match for the world's heavy-weight championship either in the United States or the Argentine apparently were no nearer completion today after a series of conferences among the promoter, Firpo, the latter's trainer, Jimmy De Forest and Jack Kearns, manager of the champion.

Rickard declined to reveal the exact status of affairs, beyond saying that "a number of things were holding up negotiations," but Kearns added that he expected definite developments within the next 48 hours. He may confer with Rickard again tomorrow on the match, he said.

The chief difficulty surrounding the bout was believed to be its site, although it was said an additional hitch had developed in the form of increased financial demands by Firpo.

Regardless of this angle, however, Firpo reiterated to Rickard his desire to fight Dempsey in his native city, Buenos Aires, while Kearns adhered to his preference for two title bouts in this country, the first with Firpo around Labor day, and the second with Harry Wills, negro challenger, about world's series time. The champion's manager was to have decided definitely today on Rickard's proposal to stage the Firpo match in the Argentine, but he reserved final answer pending possibilities of arranging the match in this country.

TRACKS OF OLD RACE ARE FOUND

Hitherto Unknown Civilization in Pacific Is Indicated By Discovery

HONOLULU, July 18.—Traces of a hitherto unknown civilization that may have existed in the Pacific 2,000 years ago have been discovered on the little islands of Necker and Nihoa in the Hawaiian bird reservation, to the northwest of the Hawaiian group proper, according to the revelations made by returning members of a government scientific party which is investigating and surveying the islands aboard the U. S. S. Tanagar.

For centuries past these isolated spots have sheltered the secret of once powerful colonies that may have flourished prior to the main Polynesian migration which resulted in the settlement of the Hawaiian group, according to A. L. C. Atkinson, president of the territorial board of agriculture and forestry, who was one of the scientific party.

Time and elements have failed to obliterate the traces of the temples, houses, and the agricultural system of long ago, and it is expected that the discoveries of the scientists may aid appreciably in the final solution of the problem of the origin and migrations of the Polynesian race.

Bowls wrought from solid stone a headless idol, and a stone adze were among the many specimens that the party brought back from the islands. The scientists told of fallen foundations that once supported houses scores of stone monuments the ruins of what were terraces upon which foodstuffs were grown, and the ruins of temples—evidence, it was said, that tended to show that Necker and Nihoa were cradles of civilization and the rendezvous of a people who were skilled in crude handicrafts and the art of navigation thousands of years ago. These specimens, together with all others gathered by the Tanagar party are being studied by scientists here now.

Naturopaths Initiate Bill for 1924 Ballot

The Oregon Naturopathic association yesterday filed with the secretary of state a proposed initiative bill to be voted on in November, 124, to regulate the practice of naturopathy in Oregon and to provide for the appointment of a naturopathic board. It also would provide for the licensing and examination of naturopathic physicians. The secretary of state will refer the measure to the attorney general for ballot title after which the petition will be circulated.

The measure was filed by Dr. J. W. Sargent, president, and Dr. Donald W. McRae, secretary of the association.

ARGENTINE PROUD BUT SHY ON CASH

Newspapers Tell Rickard to Forget Staging Bout in Buenos Aires

BUENOS AIRES, July 18.—(By the Associated Press.)—"While all South Americans are proud of Firpo, not all will pay big prices to see him fight. Quite a lot would be content to read about it afterward," says the Herald, English language newspaper, in an editorial today declaring the proposed Firpo-Dempsey bout in Buenos Aires would not be a financial success.

Asserting that the estimated gate receipts in excess of \$250,000 are too large to be attained, the newspaper adds:

"Rickard had better forget Argentina, once and for all. It is no place to stage a world's championship, because there is not enough population."
