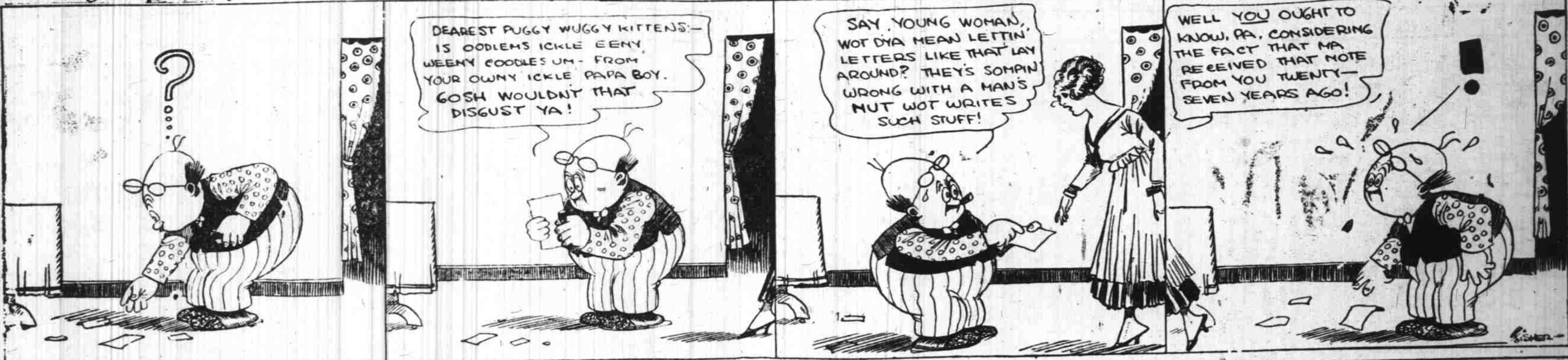

Jesse Looney died in Salem March 25, 1869, at the age of 69, and his widow survived him until May 7, 1900, when she died at the age of 92.

Education First Consideration
The son Benjamin F. Looney, whose funeral was held yesterday, was educated in Eugene, Albany and Salem, having studied both in the University of Oregon and in Willamette university. For some years after obtaining his education he followed mining in Oregon and Idaho. Later he returned to his farm and followed farming and stock raising until 1902 when he moved to Jefferson and retired.

Mr. Looney was married in 1878 to Miss Josephine Deardorf, a native of Douglas county, who survives him. She was a daughter of W. H. B. and Georgia Anna Deardorf, pioneers of 1849. Their three children are all living. They are John B., D. H. and N. H. Looney, all of Jefferson and Pauline Looney of Jefferson, Mrs. Addie Fairbanks of California, and Mrs. Frances Cornell of Salem.

New Chicago Temple Is Among Tallest in World

CHICAGO, July 31.—The new Chicago Temple built by the Methodist Episcopal church at a cost of \$3,100,000, located in Chicago's loop at the intersection of two of the busiest thoroughfares in the world, will be ready for its first official occupancy October 3, when the Rock River conference of Northern Illinois convenes.

The total value of the building one of the tallest churches in the world, and the ground on which it stands will figure nearly \$6,500,000.

The height of the structure from street to top of spire will be 556 feet, with 21 stories devoted to church and office use. The doors of the temple will be open to worshippers day and night.

250 TONS LOGANS ALREADY PRESSED

Several of the big yards that have been passing up their crop because of no good market, are now starting in to pick, and there will be a considerable tonnage of these belated berries that had at first been consigned to the demitition bow-wows.

While some of the producers are taking their juice home, to market or use in their own way, some of it is being left for collective sale as the market develops. Recent inquiries from the east indicate that the juice business is not necessarily nearly as dead as it appears on the surface. There seems to be a real demand for the fresh, fragrant Oregon berry product. The quotation of \$6 for five gallon can at the Salem factory, may be taken as a fair measure of its probable sales

The Armington juice plant, convinced that there is not only a future but a roseate present in the juice business, is building a considerable addition, besides its cold storage that is to be installed soon. Apples are already coming in for cider making, and by next week they expect apples in considerable quantities, of the Red Astrakhan and the Gravenstein varieties. Others will come in later, and the plant expects to be busy all through the season with the logans and the apples.
