## CHAMP GIANTS INCREASE LEAD

### New York Now Four Games Ahead Of Cincinnati Reds In National

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Aug. 4.—(National)—The champion Giants increased their lead over the Reds to four games by winning the first of a five-game series here today 14 to 4 before more than 20,000 fans. Luque, who had beaten the New York club three times this season, shutting them out twice, was pounded mercilessly and was knocked from the box in the fourth when the visitors scored five earned runs on five clean hits and a pass. Harris, who has won both of his starts for the Reds, was also ineffective, allowing 10 hits and seven runs in the seventh and eighth rounds. A drizzling rain in the second game bothered both Wehnert and Morrison and accounted for wild pitches.

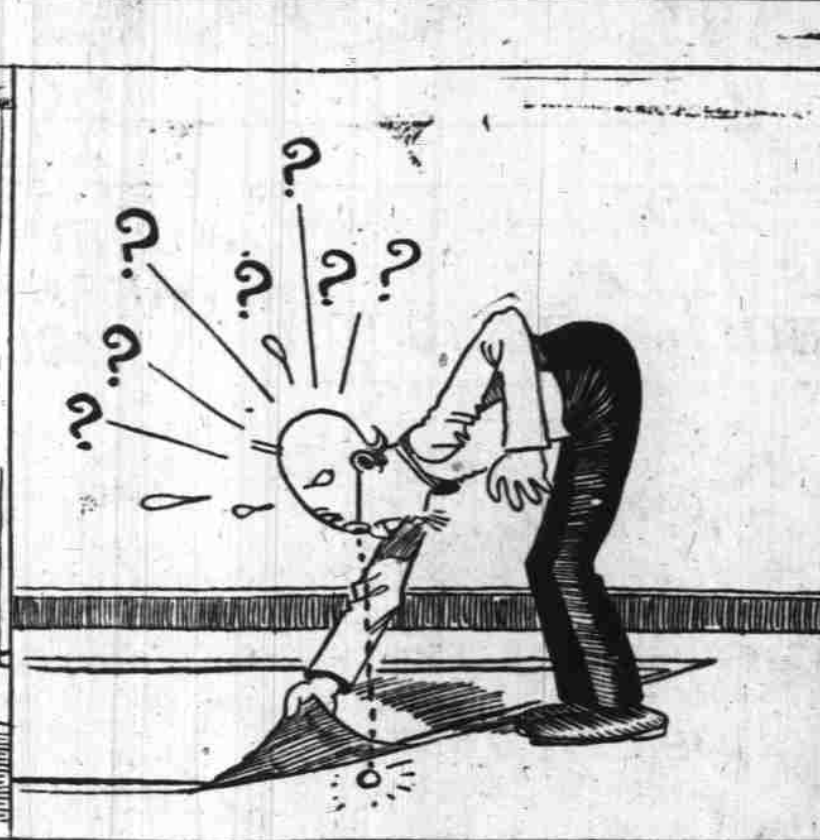

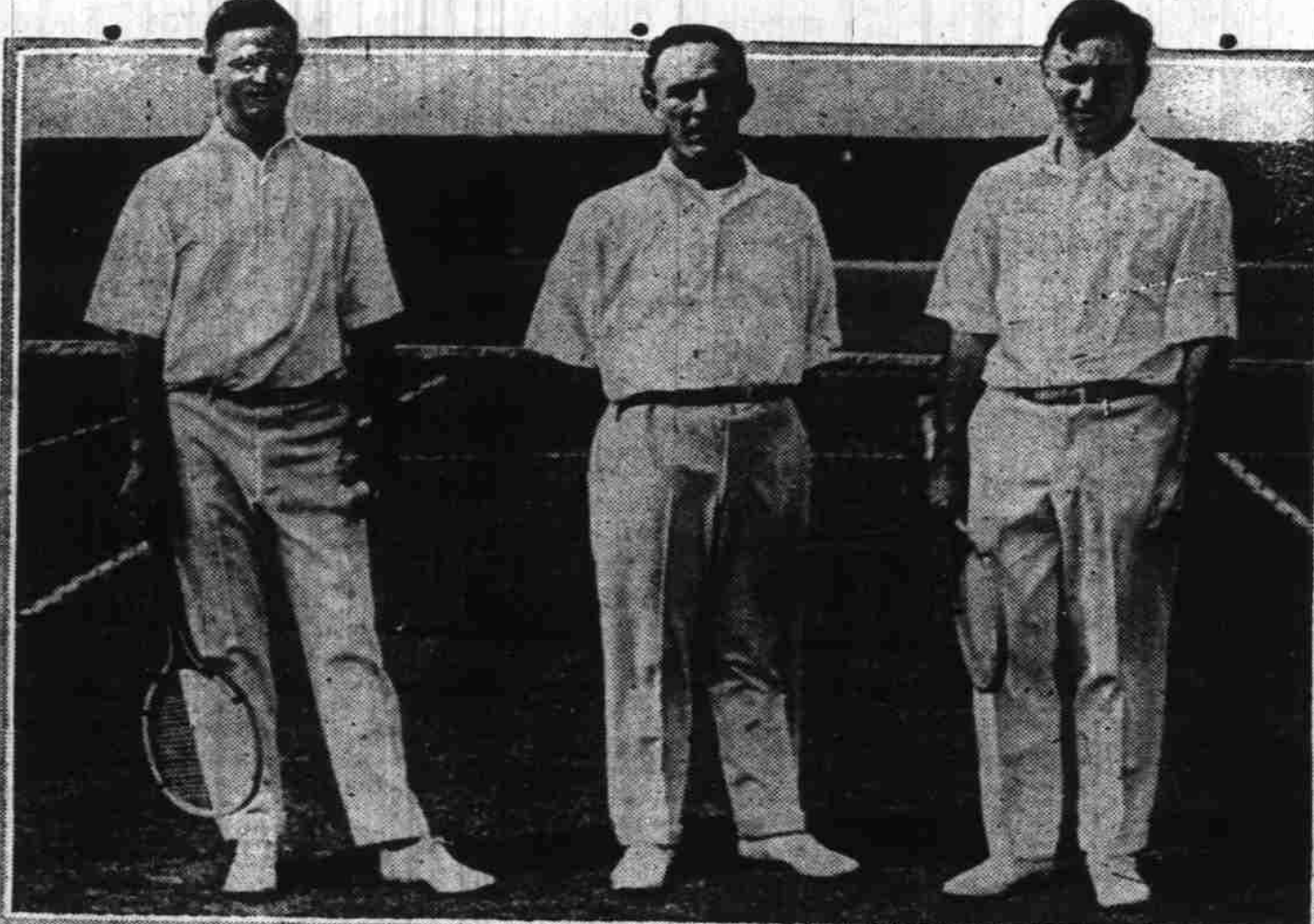
