**Missionary To Speak**—Dr. Matilda M. Hunt, of India, will address a union meeting at 8 o'clock tonight at the First Presbyterian church. Her subject will be the relief work recently inaugurated for the unfortunate people of India known as the "Children of Doom." These people are the descendants chiefly of British settlers in India—Indian mothers and British fathers, and children of marriage among British and Anglo-Indians. Their problem is not one of illegitimacy or drink, but of pitiless economic pressure, operating for generations, causing a human landslide into depths so terrible as to be incredible except to those who have seen them. There are 10,000 children in this group without education, starving, ragged and homeless. Dr. Hunt will speak of the effort being made with the lowest heathen where proselytism, especially among the growing girls, goes on apace. No collection will be taken at the Sunday evening meeting.

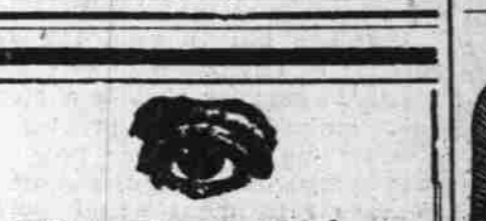
