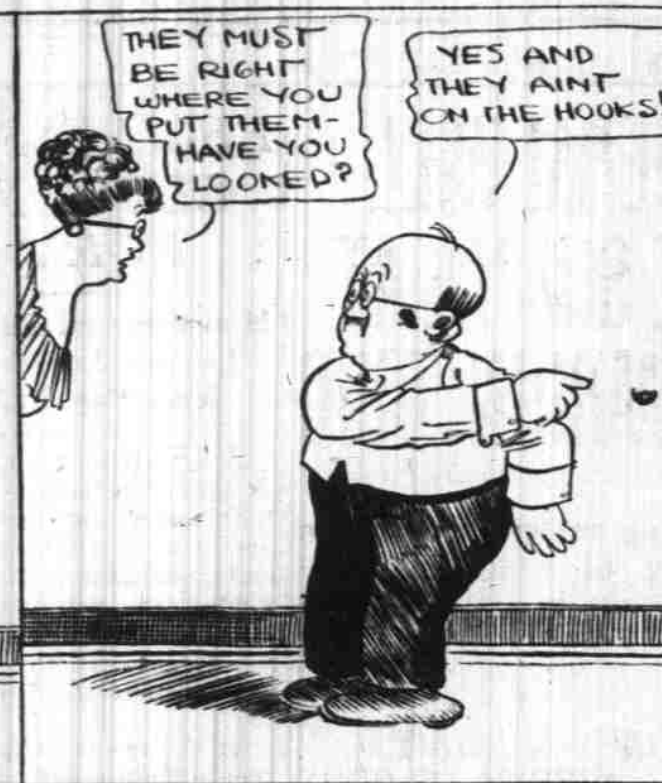
Convicted IWW Honor

SENATORS DEFEAT SHERIDAN TEAM

Many Critics Say Game Best Ever Played Here—Return Game Sunday

Many critics of the national pastime declare that the game at Oxford field Sunday afternoon, when the Salem Senators defeated Sheridan by a score of 3 to 2, was the best game ever played on the local grounds. The game was a pitcher's battle between Ashby of Salem and Meyers of Sheridan, both boys allowing nice hits. Only one error was made by each team.

Meyers was the first to give way, but by that time the game had gone 12 innings. Time after time both pitchers worked out of holes.

The first score of the game was in the third inning, when a Sheridan player crossed the plate as a result of three hits in a bunch. In the fourth inning Shackson of the Senators whacked out a homer and the score was even.

Sheridan retired Baker and Hauser on a double play, saving two more scores against them in the fourth.

Salem scored again in the sixth. Proctor was passed. He reached second on a fielder's choice, stole third, and later scored. Sheridan evened the score in the eighth, and there was no further scoring until the 12th.

Next Sunday Salem will go to Sheridan for a return game.

AMERICAN SWIMS ENGLISH CHANNEL

Henry Sullivan of Lowell, Mass., Third Man in History to Do Feat

LONDON, Aug. 6.—(By The Associated Press.)—Henry Sullivan of Lowell, Mass., has succeeded in swimming the English Channel according to a Paris dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company. He reached Calais at 8:05 tonight after swimming a distance of 90 kilometers or nearly 60 miles.

Henry Sullivan is the third man to accomplish the hazardous feat of swimming the English Channel. The first to make this passage across the narrow but always extremely choppy course, with its rushing tides and swirling eddies, was Captain Matthew Webb and the second T. W. Burgess. Both were Englishmen.

Webb made the swim on August 24-25, 1875, covering the 22 1-2 miles between Dover and Calais in 21 hours, 45 minutes. Webb was drowned July 24, 1883, swimming from South Foreland, England, to Lechatelet, France. His time was 22 hours, 35 minutes.

The present was Sullivan's seventh attempt to make the swim.

Two carloads of broom and mop handles are in the warehouse of the Oregon Wood Products company in West Salem, ready to be loaded out today for shipment abroad. One carload will go to Scotland. The other will stay in the states. The foreign shipments are just what the company can make them, for the demand is practically unlimited for goods as they are now being made in Salem.

The company has been steadily increasing its facilities, so that it now has 20 men working steadily, and a second shift for some of the machines on special catch-up work. The installation of the larger boiler, and the engine for power instead of using electricity, has been a great financial boon to the company. It has meant a saving of close to \$200 a month in the cost of operation. The company has been cutting large quantities of oak for handles, single-trees and neckyokes, and of alder and balm-wood for paper plugs. The logs are sawed up in the company's own mill, newly installed at the plant. This has greatly simplified the getting of material. Formerly there was much trouble to find enough wood, until the

company put in its own sawmill.

A new steam dry house is being completed that will more than double the former drying capacity. Some additional warehouse room is to be provided soon. A side-track from the west side railway has just been built to the factory at a time. This siding is the biggest new announcement, and it reduces by one-half the labor of loading material.

Other expansions are contemplated in the near future, as the company business, after several years of critical sailing, is now growing so rapidly that additions must be built to care for the trade already contracted.

National Guard May Be Made Use of in Election

COLUMBUS, S. C., Aug. 6.—(By The Associated Press.)—Mobilization of two companies of national guard for possible use in connection with the municipal election in Charleston tomorrow was ordered this afternoon by Governor Thomas G. McLeod. Adjutant General Robert E. Craig left here to take general charge of the situation as the governor's personal representative.

The two Charleston companies will hold themselves in readiness in their respective armories, according to a statement issued by the governor.

Lieutenant Colonel Harry O. Withington, of the infantry regiment will be in direct command of the troops.

FIFTY STUDENTS ARE REGISTERED

Second Term of Willamette Summer School Draws Better Than Ever

More than 50 students have registered for the second term of the Willamette university summer schools, the largest number ever attending for the second session. The work is progressing satisfactorily, with more options being given for choice of classes than in any other year.

Applications have been coming in steadily for registration in Willamette for the new university year that opens September 19. There are more young women registering than there are men, which, however, does not necessarily mean that there will be a preponderance of women, as they are given much closer supervision for their home life and must register at Lausanne hall or at places approved by the faculty while the men are free to live wherever they can find a place, and they usually defer their registration until they come ready to take up their school work.

It is understood that there will be a number of good recruits for the various athletic squads this year. The university has a football schedule that is a "bear," including practically every college and university in the northwest. Oregon, OAC, Washington university, Whitman, Pacific, Puget Sound, and some of the high class teams that the Bearcats will meet this year. They have every week filled from the opening until Thanksgiving day. Coach Rathbun has not yet come to make his home in Salem, but he has been putting in the summer laying plans for the coming year, and some unusual results are expected from his long season's quiet work.
