COUNTRYMAN TRAINING FIRPO FIRST TEACHER IS LEFT OUT FIGHT WITH DOWNEY TONIGHT

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 7.—Hortio Lavello of Buenos Aires will train Luis Angel Firpo for his bout with Heavyweight champion Jack Dempsey in New York on September 14, it was announced here today by G. W. Widmore, secretary of the challenger.

Widmore had stated earlier that Jimmy De Forrest, veteran American trainer who has had charge of Firpo since the Argentine forged to the front of the heavyweight aspirants would not prepare him for the championship match but did not name his successor. De Forrest is generally accredited with having taught Firpo the fine points of boxing. Widmore added that there had been no break with De Forrest.

Firpo concluded his training this afternoon for his scheduled 10-round bout here tomorrow night with Joe Downey of Cincinnati. He announced his weight was 214 pounds.

Whitfield Now Leading Mississippi Elections

JACKSON, Miss., Aug. 7.—T. G. Bilbo, former governor of Mississippi, who announced while in jail at Oxford this spring serving a sentence of ten days for contempt of federal court that he would be a candidate for governor in today's Democratic primary, forged ahead of Senett Canner, the runner-up to H. L. Whitfield when 125 precincts out of 1238 had been tabulated tonight at 11:15 o'clock. At that hour the totals were: Whitfield, 8665; Bilbo 5109; Conner 5102; Franklin 2142; Bell 1019.

Violence Marks Path Of Arctic Trading Men

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Aug. 7.—Mystery ships plying the Siberian arctic laden with whiskey, which is bartered to the natives for furs, still take their toll of murder in the piratical traffic, according to Captain Andrew Pedersen here, who says he was recently an innocent member of such an expedition. The limit was actual murder, he says, when the Siberian government attempted to stop the traffic. Captain Pedersen's story follows:

"We sailed out of Nome for what I was told would be a trading voyage to Siberia. I will not tell the names of the owners or skipper of the trader, for reasons best known to myself. At one port the boat took on a large quantity of furs, after getting the natives drunk on moonshine whiskey. An official of the Siberian government came aboard to collect a tax and force payment for the furs. He was thrown overboard and shot. The last I saw of him he was clinging to a piece of ice. I do not know whether he died or was rescued. On the cruise back I heard talk of murdering me because I knew too much. For nights I didn't sleep, and while I rested in the bunk I kept a revolver in my hand ready for action."

Chicago Library Has Books for Blind Readers

CHICAGO, Aug. 7.—In an effort to reach every sightless person in this part of the country, the collection of books for the blind in the public library here has become one of the largest in the United States, according to Nathan R. Levin, assistant librarian of the Chicago Public Library.

The blind from nearly every state in the Mississippi patronize this collection, because of its ready accessibility, declares Edward Peterson, in charge of the work. Anybody can apply for a loan, and the government permits the books to be sent out in franked envelopes.

The number of available volumes in raised printing is comparatively small, it is said, but the Chicago library, with 3,500 books, claims to have virtually everything ever published for the benefit of sightless people.
