Prof. L. E. Sparks of Washington junior high school returned Saturday from Berkeley, Cal., where he spent the early part of the summer in the famous University of California summer athletic school.

He was one of the star athletes in Willamette before his graduation and since then has coached both the Salem high school basketball team and the Willamette freshmen. He is teaching science in the school, but athletics has been his hobby, and his YMCA classes have done some excellent

gymnasium work. His sister, Miss Fay Sparks, also attended the Berkeley summer school with him this year, and has returned to Salem with him to re-enter Willamette in September. Their father, A. H. Sparks, is with them in Salem, and he may decide to remain for the winter. His home has been in Bandon, Coos county.

At Berkeley Mr. Sparks found a number of old Willamette students, about 25 in all, he reports. Among them was Bryan McKitt rick, star baseball and basketball player, who was graduated a year ago, and has had a fine teaching position at the Arcata, Cal., high school. He is retained for another year. Howard Jewett, president of the student body and a crack athlete back in 1916, was also there. So was Loren Bassler, who was graduated two years ago, and has been teaching in the Athena Oregon high school. Prof. J. T. Matthews of Willamette was the professor in higher mathematics, and all the old Bearcats visited him almost daily.
