STATE SHOOT TO START THURSDAY

Oregon National Guard Preparing for Important Event at Clackamas

The Oregon state shoot for the national guard of the state is to begin at Clackamas range, near Oregon City, on Thursday. The federal government appropriated \$6,000 to put on this sharpshooting event for the benefit of the service. This is the first year since 1915 that the meet has been staged in this state.

While the government pays the bill, it is mostly a state event, for the state troops only. There are a number of matches, to be competed for by four-man teams representing all the military units of the state. There are four principal units of the service—the coast artillery, the engineers, and two regiments of infantry, the 162nd and the 186th.

There will be rifle matches for all the organizations armed with the rifle, and pistol matches for the pistol armed troops.

One of the big events will be the regimental contest for the governor's trophy, a magnificent silver cup that was first put up as a perpetual challenge trophy in 1908. It has not been shot for since 1915. All the organizations may contest for it. Shooting 19 shots for each man for a four-man team, at 200, 300 and 600 yards, and 20 shots at 1,000 yards.
