DEER REAL PET
AT PENITENTIARYConvict Feeds Her and She
Kisses Him—Visitors
are Entertained

Just how much convicts, guards and visitors at the state prison think of Virginia, the fawn that was received from Coos county a few months ago, was aptly illustrated the other afternoon.

In a party of visitors were several children. They were delighted at seeing the deer, and child-like, wanted to pet the animal. The trusty prisoner who has particular charge of Virginia, whistled softly.

Virginia, who was feeding near the gate, some distance away, immediately abandoned the pasture and lightly bounded across a flower bed. She paused a short distance away, sizing up the strangers.

"Come, baby! Come Virginia," the convict crooned.

Virginia responded, and permitted several small children to stand beside her while kodaks were brought into action. As she stood, she nibbled a rose held by her keeper. After the pictures were taken, she inquisitively walked up to the visitors and sniffed at the strange black boxes they carried.

While the photographs were being taken in the court yard, two condemned men, Dan Casey and George Parker, watched from the second story of the prison. Casey, who is a large, heavy man, grinned as he watched the crowd below. Parker, younger and more slender, nonchalantly sat in the window and smoked a cigarette. He, too, smiled occasionally. No one watching the two men would realize that Casey will hang a week from Friday and Parker is sentenced for the following Friday. The latter's execution probably will be stayed by appeal.

The convict in the yard, the men and women visitors, and the children gathered around the playful deer—and the two men above whose days are numbered. Truly a strange assortment.

In his care of Virginia, the convict is as thoughtful as a young mother is of her first infant. Whenever he gives Virginia a drink of milk he always brings a second basin, filled with warm water. After Virginia has had her fill, and care must always be taken in order to prevent her plunging her nose to the bottom of the basin, the keeper will call "Baby" to him and gently wipe her mouth with a cloth moistened in the warm water. For, he says, unless the milk that Virginia manages to get outside of her mouth is removed, it will sour and make her sick.

Following the cleaning up process the convict will kneel and in response to his invitation, the deer will gently kiss him upon the cheek.

Virginia is greatly admired by all the men at the prison, whether they be guards, officers or convicts. She is given the freedom of the grounds and office, and makes herself at home in either. Choice flower beds are the least of her worries, and she alone scampers and crosses these without subject to reproval from those in authority.

COLONEL BARTRAM
TALKS TO ROTARYRepresentative of Remark-
able Flax Puller Sees
Possibility Here

Lieutenant Colonel W. B. Bartram of Ottawa, Ont., was the principal speaker at the Rotary club luncheon Wednesday noon. Colonel Bartram began soldiering quite some time ago. He went through the Boer war in South Africa with extreme credit. He drifted out of the warrior game for a few years, but when the World war broke out he got out the old uniform, burnished his old sword and loaded himself with cartridges for his ponderous and deadly Ross rifle. He came out with his life intact, and a title of lieutenant colonel. Also, he has a family of three boys, who organize all "the fellows," and play soldier with all Paw's war guns, to the terror of the timorous women of the neighborhood.

This time, however, Colonel Bartram comes on a pacific mission. He is representative of the Perfection flax pulling machine, that, as he says, is the first real advance step in flax growing for the past 6000 years. An extraordinarily simple machine, it is nevertheless so unique in its adaptation that it does the work that thousands of mechanicians have said couldn't be done by machinery. The experimental machine has already pulled about 125 acres in the Willamette valley. One field contained 80 acres and it

was pulled so clean that it is difficult to tell what kind of a crop was grown there.

The speaker said that his own province had in some years produced as much as 25,000 acres of flax, though this year it had only about 6,000 acres—four times what was raised in the Willamette valley. He has spent a number of days in the Willamette flax fields, and he says that never has he seen such flax anywhere. He told the Rotarians that it appeared to him that flax growing and manufacturing was to be their greatest industry. He said that not all the growers here have grasped the situation and its possibilities. It was to them merely a temporary job, he said, where it ought to be an international career. Colonel Bartram has spent years in the flax industry, and his coming with the powerful business interests he represents in the pulling machine and in the linen manufacturing industries may mean a prosperity that is more

profitable and infinitely more enduring than oil wells or gold mines.
