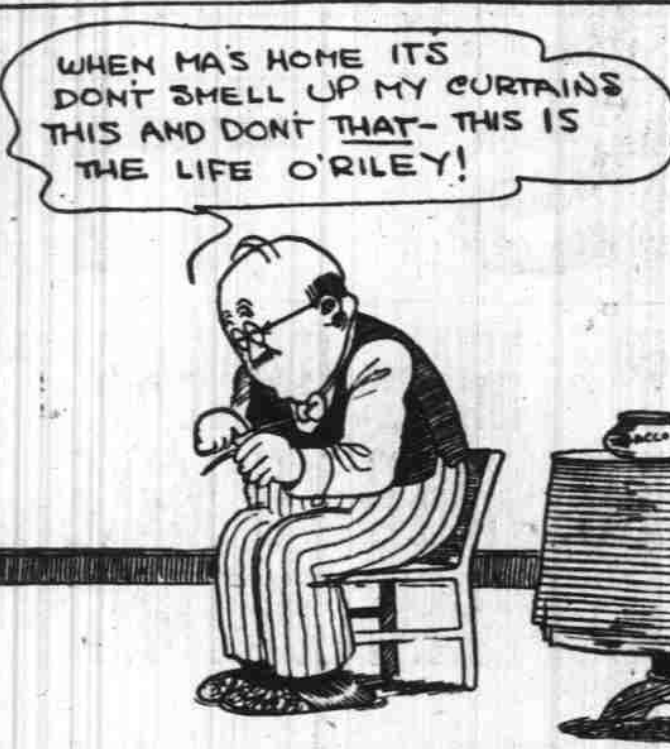

ARGENTINE SCRAPPER TAKES GO
DECISIVELY OUTPOINTS DOWNEY
DISORDERS MARK FIRPO BATTLE

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 17.—Luis Angel Firpo of the Argentine decisively outpointed Joe Downey of Cincinnati in a ten-round exhibition bout at the Hoosier Motor speedway arena tonight in the headline contest of a boxing show which was marked by a series of disorders which at times threatened to result in a riot.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 17.—Luis Firpo of the Argentine, aspirant for Jack Dempsey's heavy-weight championship crown and Joe Downey of Cincinnati met here tonight in a scheduled 10-round boxing contest. Sheriff Snyder of Marion county was at the ringside on orders of Governor McCray to stop the bout if in his opinion it assumed the proportions of a prize fight.

The bout was delayed for more than two hours due to a disagreement over the amount of money due the South American. The principals finally entered the ring at 11:25. It was announced that due to the governor's orders, the bout would be a four-round exhibition affair. Both contestants wore 16-ounce gloves.

The fight was again delayed when Hughie Gartland, business manager for Firpo announced that the South American had not received any money. The crowd was in an uproar and Mayor Shank of Indianapolis climbed through the ropes to restore order. He announced that unless the boxers and promoters went on with the fight immediately he would order their arrest.

It was then announced that the bout would go on, the contest to be for 10 rounds. Jack Druley, promoter of the contest, was located in the crowded arena and a

squad of officers detailed to accompany him back to the city with the receipts. He had been unable to make his way through the crowd to the dressing rooms of the fighters.

Sixteen ounce gloves were used by the principals as the result of an order by Governor McCray who posted Sheriff Snyder of Marion county at the ringside with instructions to stop the bout if it materialized into a prize fight which is prohibited by Indiana law.

Despite the fact that the large gloves were used, Downey received a terrific mauling at the hands of the Argentinian. Downey collapsed in his dressing room shortly after the bout and was taken to a local hospital. Physicians who examined him said it is feared he is suffering from severe injuries about the head. He is in a semi-conscious condition.

A short time after the bout was concluded officials began a search for Jack Druley, promoter of the show, following a complaint of employees at the arena and speedway officials that they had not received their money. Firpo also was said to be about \$2000 short in the purse guaranteed him.

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CAMP CASCASAN
NEARING CLOSE

Robert Shattuc Writes to
Statesman About Experiences of an Outing

Hugh Shattuc, a member of the Boy Scout camp at Camp Cascasan, writes The Statesman the following letter:

"Editor Statesman: Camp Cascasan is rapidly drawing to a close for this season. It is such a delightful camp that we all wish the closing time were as far away as possible. The weather this year has been especially fine and we have not had the discomfort of rain such as occurred last year.

"We are learning so much more this time than ever before on any Boy Scout camp. There is quite an interest being shown in the carving of paper knives from the different types of woods found around here. We are learning to make all kinds of types of fires, baking fire, frying fire and others. We have learned from Mr. Zinser the way the Indians made their arrow heads and we are trying this. Quite a number of flint chips are being found in the old Indian cave and we are experimenting with them. Several of these have been made into rather good arrow heads. The trip up to Hurricane Deck has given us the opportunity to gather numbers of different woods and shrubs till we all know at least 20 species of those growing around here. The study of birds is quite interesting, too and some 30 have been identified while we have been in camp.

"Our camp fires are very interesting and we have a fine story teller in Arthur Hamilton. He tells us several good stories every night. We are camping on the old camp grounds of the Indians and we enjoy the Indian legends that are told around the fire at night.

"The overnight hikes are very interesting because we learn to do so many things in the open when we have to depend on ourselves. Sleeping out under the stars with no tent is different from sleeping in a tent, and it

"But I am afraid we can't write it before we leave as we come home Thursday morning. It doesn't seem as if we have been up here two weeks, and we wish we could stay longer. When we get home we will have lots of things to tell and we will talk about the camp clear up till next year's camp time comes. Very truly yours,

HIGHWAYS CLOSED
FOR REPAIR WORK

Alsea Road and Bridge at
Springfield to Be Blocked
Several Days

The state highway commission announces that a short stretch of the Alsea highway near Greasy creek, about nine miles west of Philomath, will be closed to traffic for the next several days from 7 a. m. to 6 p. m., because of steam shovel operations around which it is impossible to handle traffic.

The department says that tourists who desire to travel this road should plan to reach this point at the open period because no detours are available.

It is believed it will be only a few days until the road is again open for travel at all hours.

The bridge over the Willamette river at Springfield will be closed for repairs for about 30 days, beginning Monday morning, August 20, the state highway commission announced yesterday. All traffic for Springfield and points on the McKenzie highway will be routed over the Willamette river bridge at Eugene. This detour is said to be macadamized and in good condition.
