FRENCH CAR TO
ENTER IN RACES

Peugeot Will Be Driven By Blume in Hospital Benefit Events Sept. 3

A French Peugeot racing car, driven by the dare devil Blum of Portland, will be one of the big attractions of the Labor day automobile races to be held at the state fair grounds, Monday afternoon, September 3.

With 15 racing cars already entered for the big event and the assurance of four more of the swiftest racers in the northwest, the big auto races at the fair grounds, to be given for the benefit of the Salem hospital fund, promise to be the really big event of the kind for the year's racing season.

The French Peugeot racing car is one of the highest class cars in America and is seldom seen off the big speedway events. Other cars already entered include the Baby Frontenac, driven by McKie of Portland, and the Essex Special, driven by Walker of Medford. Walker is one of the fastest drivers on the Pacific coast.

The Stutz racing car will be driven by Gus Duray of Portland. He is a hard man to pass. A Duesenberg car will be entered and driven by George Lott of Portland. He is regarded as one of the veteran drivers of the northwest and has entered in many leading auto racing events. A Maxwell special will be driven by Offutt of Medford. He is regarded as one of the prospective winners.

Efforts are being made to bring all the leading auto racing men of the northwest to take part in his big racing event. The program will be in charge of William Bell, Frank Wagar and Alton D. Hurley.

An entirely new feature will be introduced in this great Labor day race, and that is, each of the many races will be pulled off exactly on time. There will be none of the usual waiting and wrangling. Those in charge announce positively that the 3 o'clock race will begin promptly at 3 o'clock.

Before the races begin and between events, a 15-piece band will entertain the crowds. Immediately following the races, announcement will be made that dinner will be served at the First Christian church, under the personal care of Henry Thiele of Portland.

The evening event will be the dance to be given at the Pavilion with music played by Oscar Steelhammer's orchestra.

TO MAKE TRAINING
SCHOOL LAND RICH

Sixty Tons of Lime Put on Sour Land to Make it Sweet and Fertile

The state training school for boys last week received 60 tons of lime for the treatment of low land fields. Two fields are to be treated—one seeded to vetch and oats and the other to vetch and clover. The ground was found to be too sour for clover, and this is an effort to bring the land up to a high state of fertility.

The prospects for a big potato crop on the training school land is good. The best portion of the land is devoted to potatoes and gardens. By the use of fertilizer from the barns, the soil is kept in good condition.

The flax on the training school land, 25 acres, has all been pulled; pulled by the boys, and they have pulled some flax for neighbors. The school flax, 23 tons of it, has all been delivered to the state flax plant. The soil was in excellent condition when seeded, but being of poor quality less than a ton to the acre was produced—whereas the average for good land this year has been around two tons to the acre, or over.

PLAYGROUNDS TO
CLOSE AUGUST 31

Program Being Prepared for Conclusion of Season at Municipal Park

Friday, August 31, is the date set for the formal closing of the municipal free playground at the high school park on Fourteenth street.

Beginning with 10 o'clock in the morning, there will be something of interest for eight solid hours. The forenoon will be started with the flag salute, and then a song. Following that, there will be a great variety of races; 50 and 100-yard sprints, three-legged races, sack races, centipede races, shuttle relay races, all-up Indian club relay races, potato and peanut races, and baseball and basketball throwing, classified for both boys and girls, according to ages so that they will be fair competitions.

Prizes will be awarded for all the contests, some honor award that will be a token of the winners' prowess. The judges of the contests and of the other contests to be held in the afternoon, will be selected from the civic organizations that have been active in giving the playgrounds its support this year.

The families of all the children are urged to come in for a picnic dinner at noon. The playground furnishes the place, but the picnickers will be expected to provide their own lunch baskets.

In the afternoon, starting at 1:30, there will be a parade, with prizes awarded for the best three costumes or exhibits. These may be doll buggies, goat wagons, or costumes of any kind. The pageant given last year was talked of for repetition this season, but the supervisors have been too busy with the regular playground work, and they have substituted for this one spectacular feature much more of the less sensational but more helpful games and contests.

Swimming and diving, a great variety of classified races and contests that will present some performers that Salem will be proud to own, will start at 2:30. Later, there will be volleyball and basketball, for both boys and girls, and probably some indoor baseball. The program will run steadily until 6 o'clock.

While the program is eight

days off, it is an event to keep in mind as worth attending.
