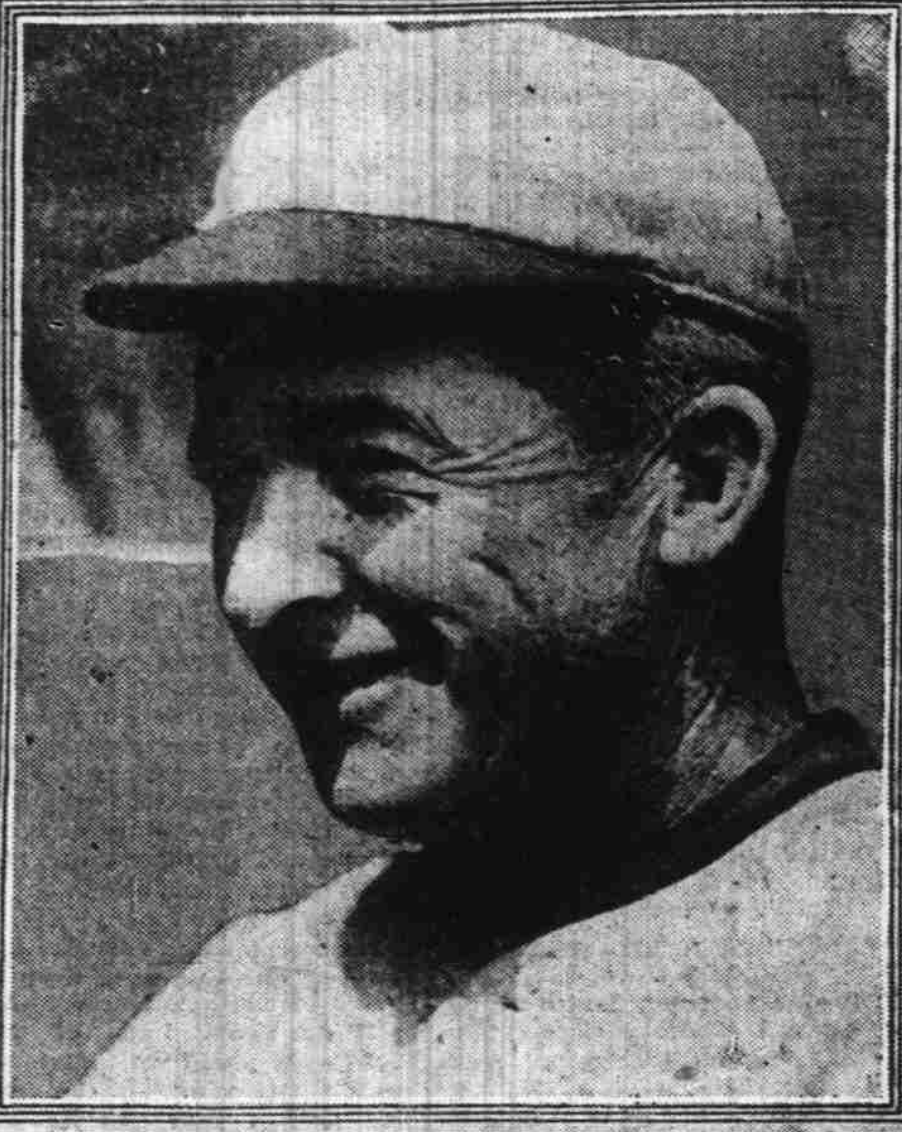
GIANT LEAD NOW ONLY THREE GAMES

Led only by Ryan of the Giants a. l. Luque of Cincinnati in percentage of victories, he is having this year his best season since 1915, when he registered thirty-one victories and ten losses for a percentage of .75.
