ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—Luis Angel Firpo is a direct descendant of Italian nobility of the 12th century.

NO BASEBALL AT THE STATE FAIR

Featherweight Champion Fights and Loses But Not With Leonard

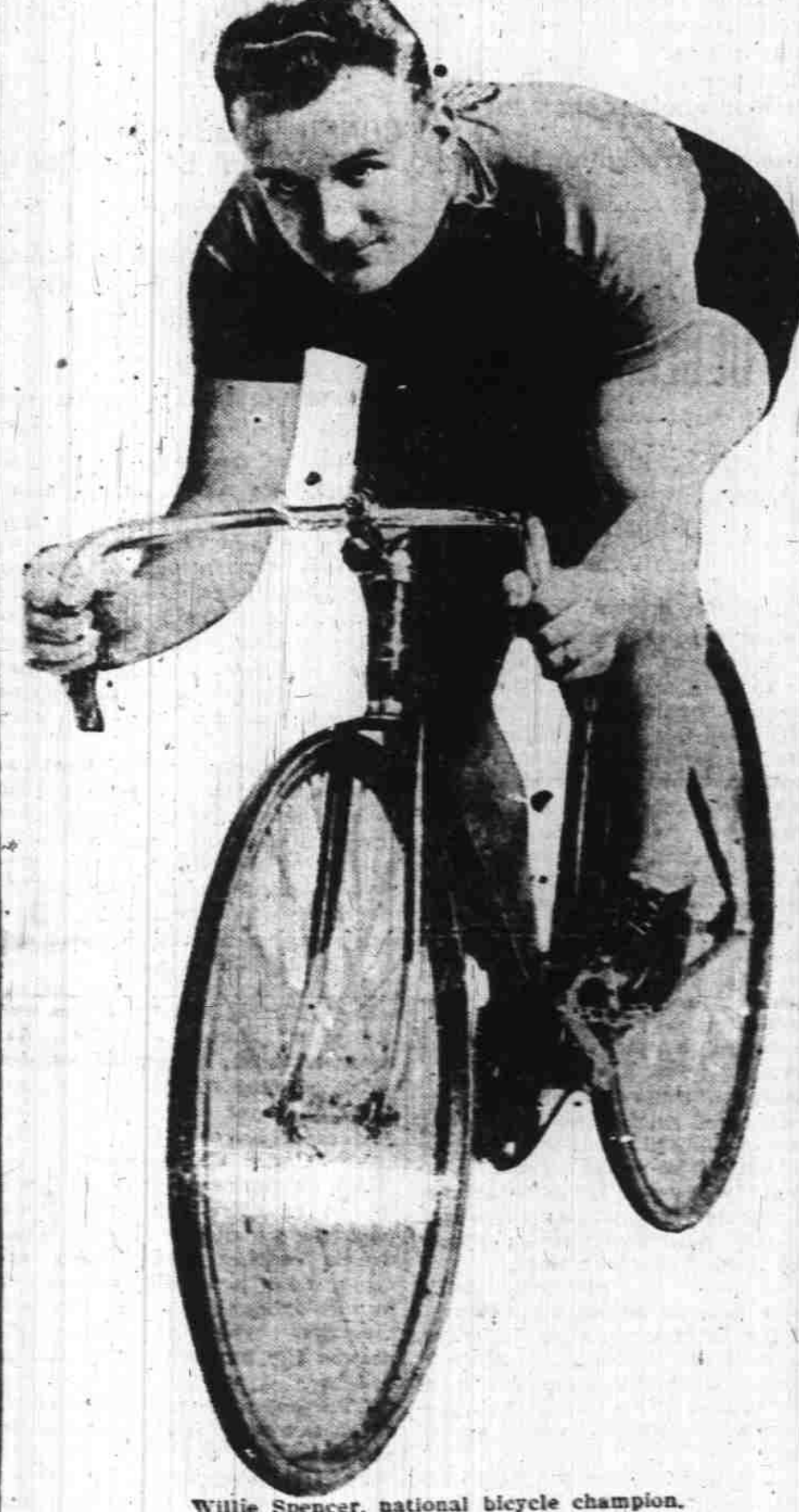
NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—Johnny Dundee, featherweight champion and lightweight title aspirant, fought and lost one battle today but it was not with Benny Leonard.

Before a special meeting of the New York state athletic commission this afternoon Dundee protested vigorously against the postponement by Promoter Johnston of the Italian's scheduled match tonight at the Yankee stadium with the lightweight champion, but after hearing all the evidence the boxing solons sanctioned the postponement.

The commission ruled that Johnston was within his rights in taking advantage of a clause in the fight contract permitting its abrogation in the event either of the principals was defeated in any other engagement before the title match. Dundee recently was defeated in a bout with Eddie (Kid) Wagner in Philadelphia.

Ku Klux Klan Falls Down With Cash for College

VALPARAISO, Ind., Sept. 5.—Valparaiso University will continue to operate regardless of the fact that organizations whereby the Ku Klux Klan was to have taken over the institution have been dropped. It was announced here tonight by Dr. H. M. Evans, president of the school.

The school was recently reported in financial difficulty and negotiations were opened with the Klan organization to assume control. An initial payment to bid the deal was to have been made by the Klan at a meeting to trustees today. When the meeting convened a telegram from Milton B. Reed, editor of the fiery Cross-Klan publication was read in which the latter stated the organization had found it impossible to take over the university because of technicalities in the charter and deeds to the school property.
