At this rate it is expected that a premium will be placed upon recruiting by the first of the year, he said. During the past three weeks enlistments have averaged between 700 and 800. Vacancies have decreased from 2500 early in July to 1700 at present. Since July 1 there have been 5347 men enlisted in the navy. With hop and fruit picking ended, Brown believes the enlistments will be speeded up and more men join the navy.

PRUNE HARVEST STARTS IN POLK

Men, Women and Children are Recruited for Fruit Picking Service

DALLAS, Ore., Sept. 12.—(Special to The Statesman).—The harvest of Polk county's bumper prune crop began Monday in a few of the orchards about this city where the prunes have ripened early. The balance of the growers in this vicinity will start the harvest of their crops some time this week or the first of next.

The crop has turned out better than at first expected and the fruit is the largest raised about here for some years past. The weather of the past few weeks has ripened the prunes fast and in many cases the fruit is falling as fast as it can be picked up by the pickers without shaking of the trees.

Several new prune dryers have been erected this year to take care of the large crop and with these new additions the crop is expected to be handled in much quicker time than in past years. It will crowd the growers to get the harvest and drying over by the first of October. Pickers and shakers are in demand and every available man, woman and child in the city and surrounding country has been hired by the growers to help harvest the crops and a large number of outside help from the hop yards near Independence have also been employed.

Several of the large Dallas crops have been contracted for by the King Products company of Salem, but the majority of the growers have not as yet sold their fruit. Several contracts have been made for green fruit by Salem concerns and the local cannery is expected to start within a few days packing green prunes.

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"One could not portray such a part without exhaustive research, without going first into the slums to study at first hand the dread effects of opiate addiction. Three From Salem Pure Bred Chester White Club Go to Portland

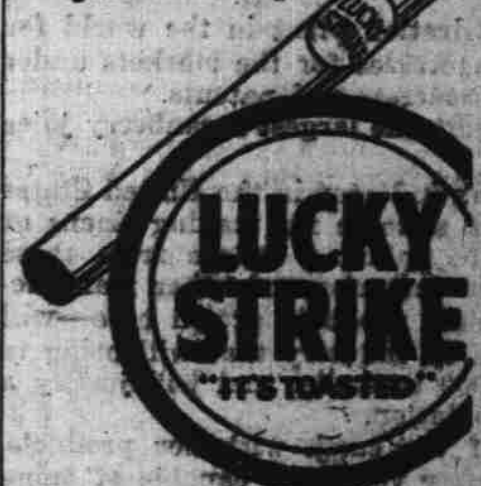
