Firpo's Record Luis Angel Firpo was knocked out in his first ring appearance as an amateur in Argentina, but since then he has never met defeat, his record reveals.

Firpo's solitary defeat was at the hands of a gentleman amateur, Angel Rodriguez, now retired from active ring competition. It was in January, 1917. The Argentine followed this setback with a string of victories, first as an amateur, and then as a professional in various parts of South America.
