SELLING PRESSURE IS AGAIN EXERTED

Market Moves With Disregard to Outside News Developments From Spain

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—Selling pressure was again exerted against today's stock market, but better resistance and net losses as a rule were held to a point or less. A few feeble rallies took place during the day in which some stocks climbed 1 to 2 points above yesterday's final figures, but these gains were either canceled or substantially reduced by the flood of offerings in the last half hour.

The market moved in seeming disregard of outside news developments. The rate of Spanish pesetas showed a slight gain despite news that the military revolt had been successful.

Coppers, rubbers and tobaccos held relatively firm. Railroad shares showed mixed changes with the active issues recovering only fractional variations from last night's closing figures.

Heavy buying of French and Belgian francs and Italian lire, all of which registered substantial gains, was the feature of the foreign exchange market. French francs jumped 10 points to 5.85 1/2

cents, and Belgian francs, quoted at 4.85 1/2, recorded a similar gain. Italian lire sold around 4.95 1/2, up 5 1/2 points. Demand sterling held steady around 4.54.

Blackberries and Pears Are Being Received Here

Blackberries and pears are being received at the Salem canneries in small quantities, and the crop is reported nearly packed for

the season. As soon as these and a few late vegetables are out of the way, canning of pears will start. The prune pack this year will be less than that of last season, a majority of the fruit being dried and packed in small cartons.
