

GETS BIGGER

Far More Entries for State Fair Event This Year Than Ever Before

The night horse show to be held in connection with the state fair, on the nights of September 24, 25, 26, 27, 28 and 29, should be easily the largest and most suc cessful ever held on the state fair grounds. A. P. Fleming of Portland is manager, and as such has charge of the entries. It is now planned to show 54 classes of harness, saddle and jumping horses during the six nights of the show. The programs will vary each evening, so that the various horses will compete for the liberal prize money in different

classes.

The Portland Hunt club horses have always been rated as among the very best hunter and jumping types to be found anywhere in the United States, and the state fair horse show will this year enter the jumpers in a number of var-

Cash Prizes Offered
Nearly \$10,000 has been offered in prizes, and many improvements have been added to the stadium, where the horse shows are held, a combination that is attracting a far larger number of entries than ever before recorded for the nightly events.

The stadium has heretofore been divided between the horse show quarters and those for the mem-bers of the industrial clubs, as well as setting aside much space for overflow exhibits from the other buildings. All this is changed, however, this year, and for the first time the big building will be devoted exclusively to what it was intended — horses. Additional stall space has been arranged, many improvements added that will add to the comfort and convenience of both horses and their owners, and everything done to make the place clean and attractive. 

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
