LEMON YELLOW MEN START TRAINING

Shy Huntington Will Whip Team Into Shape for Willamette Sept. 29

EUGENE, Or., Sept. 15.—Head Coach "Shy" Huntington, aided by his assistant football instructors who are back in Eugene, will begin Monday to whip the University of Oregon football candidates into shape, according to an announcement today at the university. Oregon has a game scheduled with Willamette university at Salem, September 29, two days before classes begin. Huntington, therefore is up against a problem to get a team in shape for its first encounter. For the first two weeks of training men will turn out twice daily, it was announced. The morning and afternoon workouts will be possible until college classes begin October 1. Huntington expects his charges to enter into some lively scrimmages before the Willamette game.

Oregon faces a hard season with the loss of ten letter men. It will be difficult for Huntington to build up a line this year because of the loss of the two Shields boys, Callison, Rud Brown and Bill Spear. He has only two regulars on the line who would be in uniform, Von Der Ahe and Cogs Campbell. McKeown and Reed will be varsity line candidates, but neither was a regular last year. Besides the men mentioned above Oregon has lost Terry Johnson, "Chuck" Parsons, George King and Horace Byler.

NEBRASKANS FILE FORD PETITIONS

Lincoln State Department Receives First Presidential Candidates Name

LINCOLN, Neb., Sept. 15.—(By the Associated Press)—The petition asking that Henry Ford's name be placed on the ballot in Nebraska as progressive candidate, was filed with Secretary C. W. Pool today, he announced. It is thought to be the first presidential candidate petition actually received officially by a secretary of state.

The petition was entered in the secretary of state's files today with 983 names out of the 1826 appearing on it accepted by the state. The remaining 843, the secretary announced were excluded because they appeared to be irregular. The petition was sent to the state department by Roy Harrop of the progressive party.

GOVERNOR WARNS AGAINST ATTEMPT ON PART

GOVERNOR WALTON WARNED TODAY that any attempt on the part of members of the legislature to convene themselves without his call, as provided by the constitution, would result in the lawmakers going to jail. A cordon of armed guards was thrown around Governor Walton's home tonight. "The invisible empire," Governor Walton declared, "assumes the functions of a political government. It has gained control of prosecuting officers, sheriffs' offices and jury commissions in many counties. It has a hooded court before whom citizens are tried. All who do not belong are aliens." He endorses tickets at general elections and its members are subject to prosecution and whipping if they fail to support the ticket endorsed. "Two governments cannot exist in this state at the same time."

McClure, president of the Tulsa Chamber of Commerce, tonight issued a statement calling upon Tulsa klansmen to disband. McClure's statement followed failure of the board of directors of the chamber to support his report to them that he had told legal klans officials that their organization should shoulder responsibility for conditions that brought on martial law in Tulsa county.
