All humanity should give thanks to Mrs. Wallace Reid for giving to civilization her much discussed anti-narcotic production "Human Wreckage" which was shown for the first time to Salem audiences Friday night at the Grand theatre and which will be the attraction for four days only.

By all odds the most predominant feature of "Human Wreckage" is the sincerity of Mrs. Reid. This courageous little woman who has just come through an ordeal of nerve-shattering terror has begun an unremitting campaign to check the swiftly spreading tide of dope addiction which is gradually encompassing the entire world.

TENTED CITY, Sept. 14.—Claude Boone, of Aumsville pitched tent today in his old location between the main entrance and the depot.

The history of the J. T. Beckwith house will be of interest. It was built by the late Henry Ankeny and George Glen in 1871 and was used by the two families. It had no floor and the sides were 10 feet high. It stood about where the judging arena now is and has been moved eight times.

When Henry Ankeny moved to southern Oregon he gave his interest in the house to J. T. Beckwith if the latter would move the building which had been ordered moved by the board. Later Mr. Beckwith succeeded to the Glen half interest in the cottage. Mr. Beckwith came out to Oregon from New York in 1872 to make cheese for Henry Ankeny. He landed here with a wife and \$11 in cash. He worked for Mr. Ankeny four years and the only money he brought with him. It was while working for Mr. Ankeny that Mr. Beckwith became possessor of the camp cottage above mentioned. As the ends of the boards rested on the ground and the ends were rotted, Mr. Beckwith cut off two feet put in a floor and a foundation leaving the house the present size. Mr. Beckwith for 27 years handled the hay and straw at the barns on the state fair grounds and never a complaint registered.

J. T. Beckwith was born in Michigan, February 18, 1846. His parents moved to New York when he was one year old. He died near Jefferson, April 22, 1923, on the farm he had lived for 45 years.
