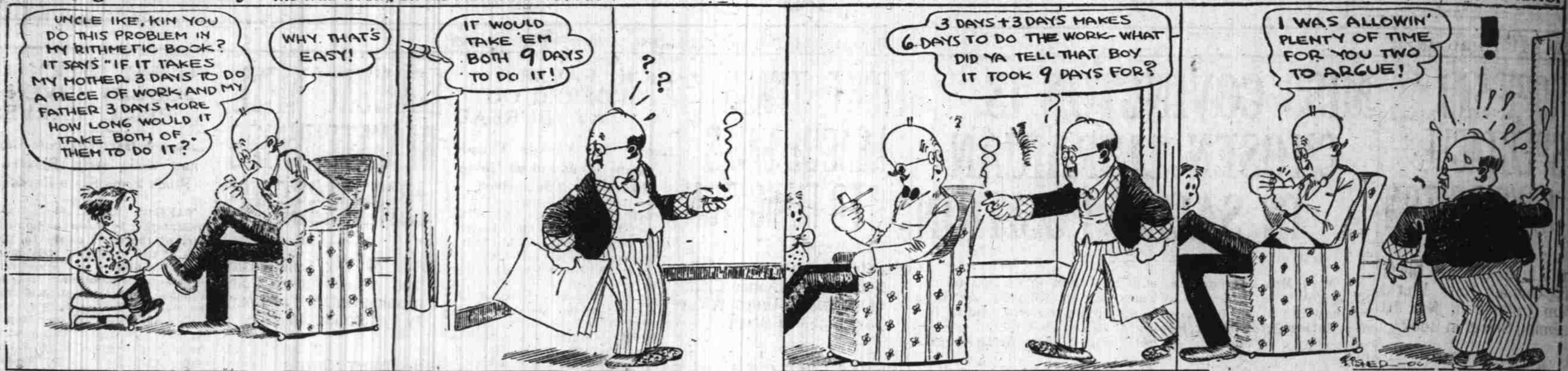

## NEGRO MATCHED AGAINST SMITH

### Harry Wills Will Fight Ten Round Contest in New York Sept. 27

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—Harry Wills, negro heavyweight title contender has been matched to fight Homer Smith, Kalamazoo, Mich., in a ten-round contest at the Queensboro stadium the night of September 27. The bout will mark Wills' first ring appearance in a year. Smith gained prominence by staying the limit of a ten round match with Luis Angel Firpo last August 3 at Omaha, Neb.

Smith was the first boxer to stay the limit with Firpo after the Argentine mauler's advent to pugilistic fame in this country. The Michigan fighter was knocked down almost at will by the South American but managed to weather the storm of blows until the last bell.
