Watch the Kiddies—Three cases of diphtheria were reported to the state board of health from Marion county the past week. Upon the opening of schools the danger of disease is enlarged. Writing further the board says, "The means of transmission and also the method of control of the diseases are well known to the health authorities today. Failure to control them is due to the lack of cooperation on the part of parents and teachers. Best results are obtained by school supervision under the direction of a school physician or public health nurse. In the absence of these it is the duty of the teachers to make daily inspections of the schools, and keep a close watch upon the pupils for communicable diseases. Upon the first appearance of symptoms children should be promptly excluded from school."

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OPENING CHAPEL SERVICE IS HELD

J. W. Day of Portland and President Doney Address Students

"Willamette is richer in tradition than any other school in the country; you cannot study the history of Oregon or the northwest without studying the history of Willamette." J. W. Day, representative of the board of trustees, told Willamette university students congregated for their first chapel service yesterday. He concluded with a plea that the present students should do nothing to mar the old traditions, but rather that they build on them.

More than 500 students are now registered in Willamette and were present for the chapel service yesterday. In his opening talk to the students, President Doney pointed out the privileges which they were to enjoy and urged full participation in them. Continuous class attendance and having received their usual share of consideration, the president urged that the students would refrain from hazing, that "you may bring no reproach upon yourself, your class, or your university."

The harvesting of clover seed, which has been the chief occupation of Silvertown farmers for some time has been replaced by that of silo filling. As an average the clover seed crop is reported as being poorer than looked for earlier in the season. Many farmers report a harvest of but 75 to 100 pounds an acre. Others report an average of three bushels an acre. One seed grower raised as high as seven and a half bushels of seed to the acre.
