Burris Changes Date of Salem Smoker From Friday to Saturday

Paul Burris, matchmaker for the Salem boxing commission, announced last night that to avoid a conflict with a smoker in Portland he had found it necessary to change the date of the Salem smoker this week from Friday to Saturday night.

Phil Bares will take on Billy Leonard, instead of the opponent previously announced, for the reason that the latter has to appear on the Portland card. Leonard has won his last four fights by knockouts.

As a semi-windup event Burris has matched big Bill Hunt to box with Lone Wolf McDonald of Portland. It will be a six-round go.

WILL PREVENT ANY SESSION SAYS WALTON

Klux Klan was proclaimed as an enemy of the state of Oklahoma under his martial law proclamation of September 15, the session therefore would be in defiance of the laws of the state and an attempt to break the peace.

As a precaution against any attempt of the legislators to meet elsewhere should they be barred from the house chamber at the state capitol, the governor also directed Adjutant General Markham to disperse the meeting "any other time or place in the state of Oklahoma."

Will Prevent Assembly "The troops will be ordered to shoot to kill if that is necessary to prevent the assembly, Governor Walton told newspapermen. I hope, however, that no such excessive measures will be necessary."

The governor asked he intended taking action in the federal court to determine the legal status of proposed meeting. He likewise denied that he had sought federal aid in his war on the Ku Klux Klan.

"Whenever the government steps in the issue is theirs," the executive asserted. "I would like for them to take over this fight."

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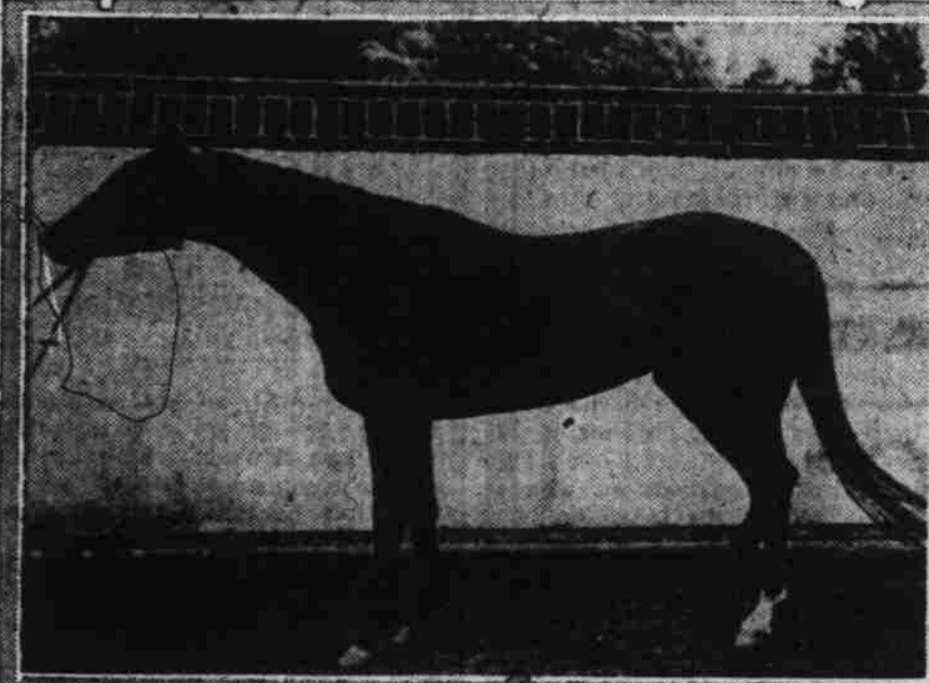

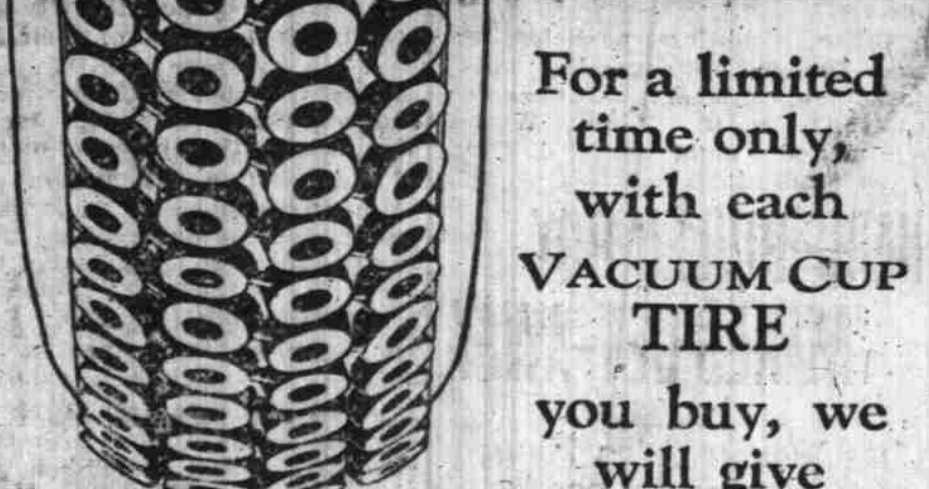

Marion Clubs Occupy Half Of One Livestock Barn

Two barns will not hold the exhibits made this year by the boys' and girls' clubs at the state fair while five years ago only 17 animals were entered, according to L. J. Allen, state livestock club leader, who is in charge of the exhibits.

Three years ago the boys' and girls' exhibits had grown to a place where the fair board placed one barn at their disposal and it was two thirds filled. Last year tents took care of the overflow from the barn assigned to the

club members. This year the exhibits made by Marion county boys and girls alone fills more than half of one barn.

To say that the clubs have two barns, filled and overflowing, is not telling the whole story since those in charge have doubled the capacity of one barn by building another line of stalls down the center of the barn.
